
# in the beginning...














Alma College Dance Company uses own students for Sugar Plum Fairy.

Alma College Dance Company collaborated with the Alma Symphony Orchestra to present the Nutcracker in the Heritage Center Presbyterian Hall. They performed five times between November 14 and 17, 2002. Tom Morris, assistant professor of dance, began preparing in early September for the third full-length performance by the Alma College Dance Company. This was the first year since the production began in 1998 that students from the college were cast as the Sugar Plumb Fairy. "It is significant to be able to have an entire student cast without guest performers," stated Morris. Students Anna Long (04) and Lynsay Masters (04) alternated between the Sugar Plumb Fairy and Snow Queen. "I was triple casted, so I was really busy with parts, but I had an awesome time. Switching off was good because I got so much experience,














# sports















The ceremony began with the invocation led by Reverend Christine Vogel. David Chapoton, Chair of the Board


of Trustees, delivered a welcome from the Board followed by "Loch Lomond," performed by the Alma College Choir.

# Reaching New Heights











The club's biggest task for the year was initiating a recycling program. They provided each residence hall with blue barrels to collect plastic, glass, newspapers, cardboard and






### **Highland Dancers**




While students in Michigan were freezing at the end of February, their peers in Florida were pushing up their sleeves and working hard to build houses in the Southern sun.










### A NEW BEGINNING





## Bursting the Bubble










