



















These renovations have included a complete revamp of the hole into a student entertainment room consiting of two pool tables, an air hockey machine, and a widescreen TV. Other continuing renovations have been installing new kitchens into some of the dorm lobbys and a remodeling of the rotunda. By far the biggest change this year for students to accomodate to was the introduction of key cards. Students now have one card that serves as identification, a library card, a meal card, and as their key to residence halls.

Additions like these are not the end for Alma College. Every year there are new renovations for students to look foreward to that help keep the school up to date and looking great.



























As of now they play without a coach. The team is awarded the \$200.00 for fees which is the standard club amount given by student congress. Most players provide their own individual equipment.




















