They added two more in the ninth on five hits and the game was over.

Sanford pitched a steady game but did'nt seem to have anything particularly hard to solve but was backed up with almost perfect support and pulled out on top. He secured only three strike outs to Johnny's ten.

Sandy Duncanson played in rightfield but could not return a ball to the infield. Each time the ball was knocked in his territory an infield had to go to his relief to relay the ball in. We greatly missed his batting as he was batting at a .496 clip for ten games and was at his best with men on the bases.
