Show Speed Taking First In llashes And Low Hurdies.

For the very good reason that al previous meets that have been planned this year hede been postponed because of adverse weather conditions, the coach thought best to send a few of the men to a try out track meet at M. A. C. The meet was simply a try out as far as Alma was concerned, any points she scored not counting, according to previous arrangement. The meet itself was a regular duel meet between M. A. C. and Olivet, M. A. C. winning out by a margin of 28 points.
Fleety McComb, Capt Chapel, Whittemore and Marsh were the men sent. With nothing special to work for except the experience gained, the four men showed up suprisingly well. Fleety was back into his old nine ninety nine traces and stepped off his events with no one to bother him, Chapel follow ing suit.
The track was not in the best of shape owing to the heavy usage during the intercholastic meet a day or two previous. McComb won both the 100 yatd and 220 yard dashes the first in the fast time of 10 flat and the second 22 and twofifth seconds. He intended entering in the 440 or the one-half mile but these events came too near the sprints.
Chapel won the 220 lew hurdes in the fast time of 26 two fifths seconds. He would also have placed in the 100 yard dash had he not slipped at the start.
Marsh and Whittemore in the mile and two mile respectively did'nt place but both ran a much better race than they have done here-to-fore.
