First Game of the Season Won by Clean Foot Ball and Alma Spirit.

RETURN OF OLD TIME PLAYING

The First Foot Ball Came of the Season was Played on Davis Field Oct. 2.

The game was snappy from start to finish and was particularly interesting since it was the first hard game for Alma's team. The teams were about equal in weight; but, Alma won through brains and grit.

Big Von, the captain, did what everybody expected he would do and a little bit more. Olle Anderson threw Saginaw out of the way whenever they got in his path. Misenar went into every play like a battering ram, and showed what he could do for Alma. Kefgen was there with his usual style and his usual game. Hooper did remarkable work in tackling. Fraker showed what head work and "sand" can do.

The game by plays is given as follows: At 3:00 o'člock Alma kicked off to Saginaw who ran it back 5 yards. Saginaw gained 1 yard on second down. Saginaw punted to Campbell who ran it back 7 yards. 

It is hoped that all who are eligible will take advantage of the opportunities of research work offered and make the club as strong as possible.


