The First Foot Ball Came of the Season was Played on Davis Field 0ct. 2.

The game was snappy from start to finish and was particularly interesting since it was the first hard game for Alma's team. The teams were about equal in weight; but, Alma won through brains and grit. Big Von, the captain, did what everybody expected he would do and a little bit more. Olle Anderson threw Saginaw out of the way whenever they got in his path. Misenar went into every play like a battering ram, and showed what he could do for Alma. Kefgen was there with his usual style and his usual game. Hooper did remarkable work in tackling. Fraker showed what head work and "sand" can do.
