## M.A.C. EVENS UP

3 to 1

## GAME 15 A PITCHER'S BATTLE

Called In Sixth Inning Because of a Late Start

M.A.C. evened up on Alma for the season by taking the game Saturday. Pattison was again in the box for M.A.C. and was opposed by Sandy Duncanson. A pitcher's battle issued in which three hits were gathered off Sandy as to two off Pattison. Pattison was the wilder of the two but received better support and finally won out. The game however was called at the end of the sixth to allow Alma to catch the train.

Graham opened the game by drawing a base on balls and reached third on a passed ball and wild pitch. Call struck out and Graham was caught at the plate when Sandy hit to short. Sandy was caught off second a few seconds later ending the inning.

Weston hit the ball pitched for a double, Mills drew a base on balls Harvey got a life on Burkes error, Orr hit to Burke and Weston was forced at second, Campbell attempted to complete a double play but Phillips dropped the throw which was a difficult one to handle. Mills scored on the play and Harvey a second later when King dropped a throw to catch Orr taking second.

Alma scored in the fifth. Campbell drew a base on balls, took second on King's out and third on Graham's single. Call drew a base on balls filling the bases but Sandy struck out Burke was hit by the pitcher and Campbell scored. Hole hit to Mills and was thrown out at first.

M.A.C. scored again in the fifth Weston singled, Mills reached first on an error by Burke, Weston took third on Kings error but was thrown out at home on Orr's smash at Burke. Mills took third on the play and scored when Sandy fumbled Baker's grounder. Pattison struck out ending the inning.

The features of the game were few and far between from an Alma standpoint. The hard trip of the week seemed to have put the boys in hard shape and a good many

unexcusable errors were made. The fielding was the worst exhibition that Alma has put up this year.

From the beginning of his work at Alma the professor has put forth never ceasing efforts to make Alma a winner in both oratory and debating. He has kept at it so strenuously and unselfishly that those who have been under his coaching could not refrain from expressing their gratitude to him. Stanley Graves'10 made the presentation speech in which he told at length of Prof. Adams zeal for the success of Alma students and his willingness to forego many personal pleasures that he might have more time with his classes and those he was training.

The speech of acceptance was brief and to the point, being characterized by sincere appreciation of the gift and a desire to do more for Alma in the future than in the past.

Whatever we have gained in the way of oratory or debating in the last few years has been the direct result of his efforts and we are fully confident that we shall make as much or even more improvement in the next few years than we have in the past, because of Prof. Adams' ability and untiring efforts.

Friday at Hillsdale Alma won her eighth straight victory and added another cup game to her list making a total of six M.I.A.A. all of which are on the credit side of the edger.

Hole was in the box for Alma after a rest in the pitching line for two weeks. His layoff didn't help him as he was very wild and kept getting himself in threatening situations. Eight hits were gathered off him, several of which were due to the bad field. He was relieved by Sandy in the eighth who retired the men in easy order.

Graham opened the game with a pretty single, was sacrificed by Call to second and scored on Sandy double to right, Burke struck out and Hole got to first on an error but was caught stealing.

In the second, Phillips out Walrath to first, Kefgen drew bases on balls, Montieth ditto, King forced Kefgen at third but "Ocky" scored Montieth and King with a double, Call grounded to Walrath and was thrown out at first.

In the third Sandy singled, Burke sacrificed, Hole singled and Sandy scored, Phillips singled and Kefgen doubled and Hole scored, Phillips being held at third. Montieth ended the inning by fanning.

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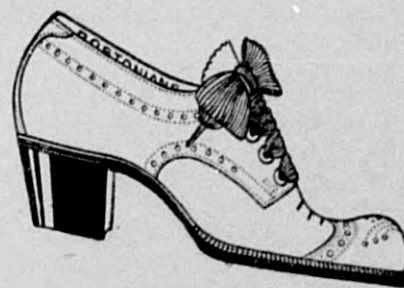
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# NORMALS DEFEATED

Alma batted much heavier than the box score intimates as each of the six smashes caught by normal outfielders were of the most healthy variety. Home runs were robbed from Sandy, Phillips and Campbell.

Only four men were sent to represent Alma at the triangular meet at Lansing between M.A.C., Olivet and Alma. In points awarded Alma made a sorry showing but in several events did good work.

Capt. McComb was far from his usual form and according to the judges drew only third place in the 100 yd dash. The first three men were so close, however, that it was hard to distinguish who was the victor. Many of the spectators judged that McComb broke the tape first.

"Fleety" got second in the 220 yd dash and but for a very slow start would have landed first place.

Kefgen took two thirds in pole vault and high jump but made good height in each the distance being 10 feet 2 inches and 5 feet 6 inches respectively.

Campbell got third place in the quarter mile which was done in the fast time of 51 1-5 sec. Edgerton failed to place in the shot put but heaved the missile 35 ft 10 inches which is better than he has done heretofore.
