1000 per cent Intercollegiate Champions.

Michigan Intercollegiate champions with an absolutely clear title is what the boys brought back from Kalamazoo. The Bracket Cup is back in the library after a years absence and, well it looks good. It was only put there by the Alma fight and no predictions as to who would bring back the championship from the annual doings could be hazarded until the last man took to the bench. The history of how it was all done would be an account of one of the closest fights in the intercollegiate annals, ending in a wind up that made the heart go pitty pat.

To start the ball rolling it became necessary for the maroon socks to defeat Kalamazoo in order to place in the finals. This was done quite handily. The game was called at ten in the morning and two hours later Alma had things nicely packed away on ice cooling off at eight above zero. Hole pitched a beautiful game and never failed to pull out of tight holes when necessity demanded. When it comes to giving away hits Ollie is a tight wad. You can't work him and you cant even find him and the Kalamazoo contest was no exception.

At 2 p. m. however somebody lit the fuse and there was some thing doing till the last parting shot was fired. Olivet and Albion were scheduled to slaughter each other, the winners to play Alma for the ribbon. The fight was on in earnest. The two teams were exceptionally well matched and for a few innings it was nip and tuck for the honor of putting one over. Albion turned the trick in the sixth and chalked up two, Olivet presenting their compliments and the three runs that won the game in the seventh. The game finished in this manner and the Alma aggregation took fresh hope as it became evident that the crimson would be their contestants. The little unfinished argument of a week previous was quite pressing and the boys were especially anxious to have it off their minds.

After five minutes for refreshments Alma and Olivet crossed bats for the championship struggle and a struggle it proved to be. Both teams were tired, of course. Double headers are not condusive to the best results. While Olivet had ample reason to be, perhaps, a little the worst for wear yet they had the advantage of being right

in the fight and under way, whereas the maroon socks took five innings to work out the kinks and sore spots of the morning celebrations.

The fire works began at once. Graham and Call were out. Sandy dropped on the leather for a double and scored on Burks nice double. Hole next up cracked out a clean hit and the inning ended with the next out and two on; Alma one point to the good. Olivet could'nt connect up in their half and were retired in apple pie ordar. The second did'nt help much in a scoring way for the wearers of the A, but it gave Olivet a boost, however, two hits and a walk netting them one tally, Sandy dividing the hitting honors with the batters just to keep things exciting. The third round did the business, Call first up managed to get out. Sandy took a walk to first. Billy Burke was hit by one of Wallicks benders Ollie Hole waited for four wide ones and with the bases full and one out Phillips and Sandy worked a beautiful squeeze play scoring what proved to be the winning run. Monteith decided to return to the bench and the inning closed with two on. This tells the story

from a scoring view point but the remaining six innings were a series of alternations from joy to nervous prostration.

The championship was'nt safe for a second, and chances to put it in the cooler were passed by so near and so often that it proved quite annoying. Sandy took a streak for the bad in the third and Hole stepped in and held things up, retiring two men and closing the inning, leaving three disappointed crimson base runners with no chance to score. In the fourth Sandy returned to lime light and pitched his usual form for the remainder of the struggle. The move was a good one and both men deserve credit, Sandy for admitting his temporary weakness and Hole for holding things up so beautifully. The fight continued till the last dog was hung and never has there been a better one in the history of the intercollegiate.

All of Prexy's big family join in wishing Mr. and Mrs. Gaunt the greatest success.



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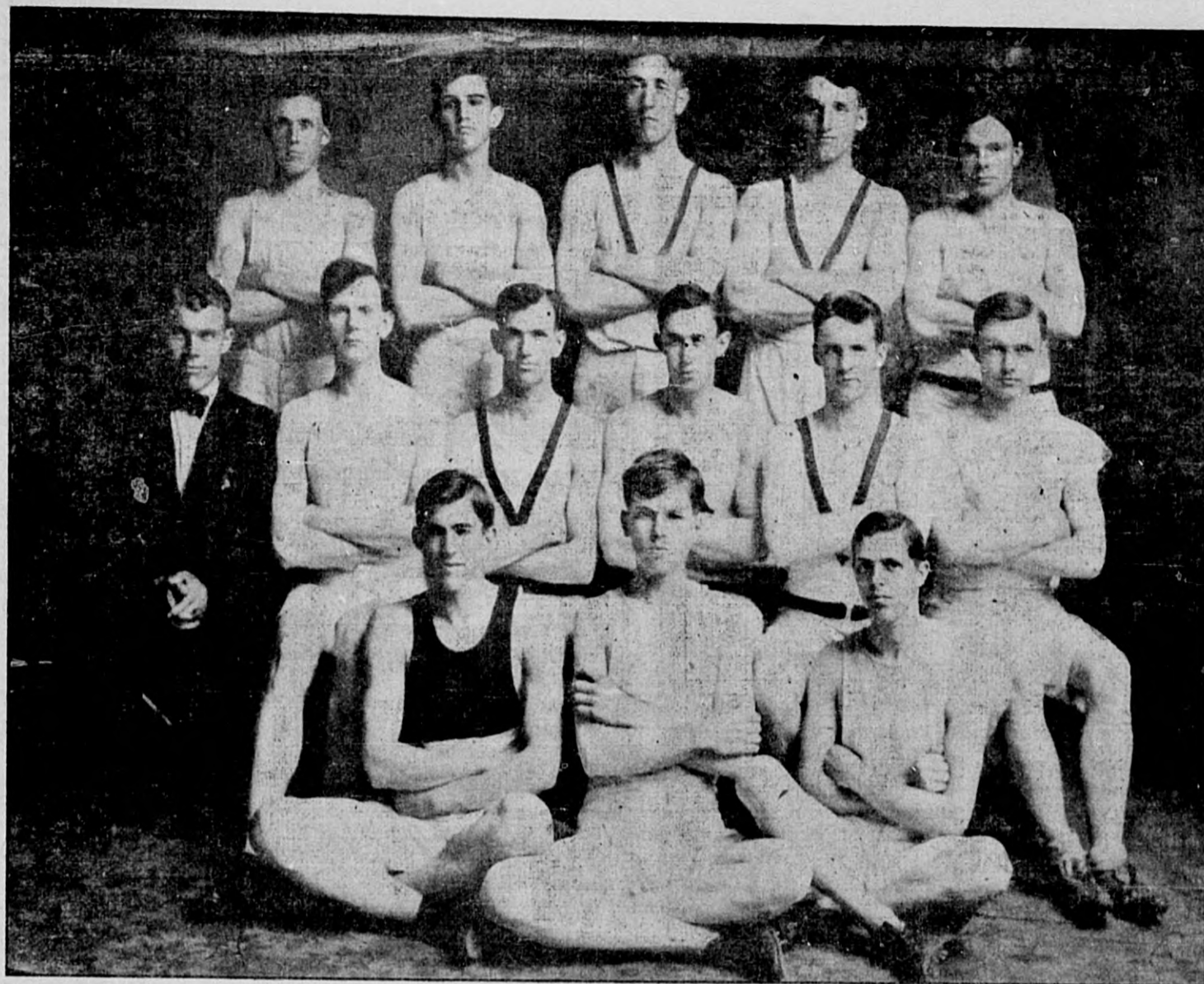

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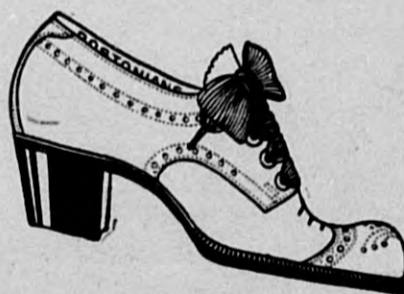
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
