A Registration Fee of \$1 is to be sent to the Dean, Rev. Alfred Ray Atwood, of Lansing, Mich.

Room reservations are made in the order of applications received and after the payment of the registration fee. Rent, including care of room, will be \$1 for the week. Each person is to furnish his own bed linen and towels.

Board will be provided at about 50c a day. For room and board write to Pres. Blaisdell, Alma, Mich.

This summer training school for Sabbath school workers will be contemporaneous with and followed by a conference for ministers and religious workers, July 20 to Aug. 1. For further information write to Pres. Blaisdell, Alma, Mich.

The Alma College library, with over 25,000 volumes and many periodicals, will be open throughout the session. The Hood museum will be open at specified times.

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
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
