At present there is seant opportunity for the developing of literary talent as regards a paper. With a monthly in operation, more students could contribute, those with ability as cartoonists would be in demand, and in this way more interest would be created.

The remark that the news would be stale is not worthy of consideration, for such a statement is equally true of the weekly Almanian. The larger newspapers are read for fuller accounts, and as for the happenings recorded, they are well known before the paper makes its appearance. The only excuse for the existence of a college paper is that there may be some record left behind of interesting occurences, which in the swiftly passing weeks easily slip from our minds. And if the papers are not preservedof what great value are they ${ }^{9}$
. With a new set of editors and managers for a new year, might the experiment not be given a fair trial at least-and should the trial prove a failure then, and not till then ought anyone to be content to return to old methods.
