Clement Francious Dubois, the composer of this great cantata, was born in Rosnay, France, 1837. He studied at the Paris Conservatory gaining the prizes in Harmony and Fuge. Later he won the "Prize of Rome" under Ambroise Thomas in 1861. He later became professor of Harmony in the Conservatory and finally in 1896 was given the directorship. His success was gradual and only came through long and patient endeavor. His "Sept Paroles du Christ" was first performed on Good Friday at a Conservatory concert.




