

DR. BLAISDELL GOES TO PENN.

Tuesday morning Dr. Thomas C. Blaisdell announced his resignation, as President of the Alma College to take and the thirtieth of August, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees which was to meet in the afternoon in order that he might accept a position as dean of the department of Liberal Arts at the Penn State College of Pennsylvania. At 1:30 o'clock the board met and accepted the resignation, at the same time requesting Dr. Blaisdell to remain as the College's executive until the fifteenth of August. In the same meeting the chairman of the Board was instructed to appoint a committee to consider the matter of a successor to Dr. Blaisdell.





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
