SUCCESS OF THE HONOR SYSTEM.

On account of recent discussion we have been interested to note some of the editorial expressions in other college papers.

In the last issue of the Hillsoale Collegian attention was called to the success of the honor system as operated in that institution. We refer to the situation at Hillsdale only because it may be typical of the spirit prevailing in many other schools.

At Hillsdale there is a student senate or board of control which together with the faculty supervise student activities. By an article of the constitution upon which the honor system is based any student who discovers his fellow sument cheating is asked to report the case at once to the stument senate. Every member of the institution becames thereby responsible for the success of the plan. As soon as any person or a number of persons in the college fail to see their responsibility or refuse to do their sharp in supporting this constitution dale. the honor system automatically becomes worse than a failure. 

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
