(Written by R. S. Clark, M. A. C., while waiting for a train after the Albion Conference, where Whitehair of Cornell spoke on behalf of the War Prisoners.)

Stop just a moment, classmate, college brother of mine, And let me show you a picture of an up-to-date design. Imagine a dreary level plain, devoid of grass or tree, Where long squat, barn-like barracks stand in dull drab misery. 



Alma was very happy to welcome back to the campus Rev. Allured, the author of the college song.

It was very interesting to hear one who had witnessed the changes in China, especially after the revolution of 1911. The revolution was more thorough in Canton Province than in any other part of China. Many of the Chinese, especially the revolutionary soldiers, even adopted American styles. Many of the big cities were cleaned up; sanitary systems put in; schools were re-organized after European methods. Judicial courts were opened and equity well founded. Rev. Allured gave a very high tribute to the men in general who led the revolution.

The re-actionary revolution of 1913 was directed by the old Dynasty in Pekin. It was trying to establish the old regime. Rev. Allured spoke his confidence that the revolution of 1911, Wisconsin and Tri-State college. At which was a revolution of western ideas, had gone too far to be checked by the old Dynasty. The revolutionary party in China to-day is composed of student leaders, and men who have studied the western civilization. Rev. Allured affirms that this type of leadership, with the influence of Christianity, will bring China through to an enlightened democracy.
