WHY WE DID IT.

Heretofore the first issue of the Almanian has not been published until the third week of college. By a unanimous consent the cabinets of two Christians Associations agreed last June not to issue the "Student's Hand Book" of information. So the Almanian staff has decided to publish the topics and leaders of the different meetings, weekly; also to give such information to new students at the begining of the year as was formerly found in the "Hand Book." So for that reason together with the fact that a great number of changes have taken place on the faculty that will be of interest to our readers we have decided to issue the first number on the opening day of college, the second on the week following.

The staff has had two difficulties to contend with in issuing this number: Separation from the college and from each other made it somewhat of a task to procure the necessary articles and advertising. However we hope that our efforts will be at least acceptable if not appreciated by our readers.

ASSOCIATION GREETINGS.

Two of the most important and active organizations of the college are the Young Men's and the Young Women's Christian Associations. Through these associations a large part of the social activities as well as the religious work are carried on. These organizations are constantly becoming more active, and are more strongly supported by the members of the college than ever before.

Friday night of this week the Y. M. C. A. members invite every man of the college to the "Stag Reception" given in the association room in Pioneer hall. The ladies invite every woman of the college to a reception at the same time given by the Y. W. C. A. members in the Wright hall. These are to help the new and the old members of the college to get acquainted with each other and to start out the year in the proper way. No one can afford to miss these receptions, and what is more, no student can get the most out of the college who does not affiliate himself with the association work. The time to do it is right at the beginning of the year. Hand your name to any member of the cabinets and become an active worker IMMEDIATELY. The Associations need you and you need the Association work to round out your college training.

Last year the Y. M. C. A. claimed every college man (except one as a member, and this year expects to do even better, by having every man in college a member.) We have the best record in the state now and want to make a perfect one this year.

The Y.M.C.A. last year was none the less successful in its efforts, and with careful plans that are already layed for the coming year, it is expected that this will be the banner

term for that association. One week from Friday night the social committee of these two associations, will make provisions for the big opening reception at Wright hall, and here is a chance for the freshmen boys to break themselves into the "Wright Hall habit." At least every student of the college as well as the members of the faculty are expected to be present and get acquainted with each other. The plans this year are to make this reception the best ever.

Then there comes the regular religious meetings of each association every Sunday evening. These are always interesting and very helpful. They are usually conducted by some student member of the association, and an opportunity is given the members to take an active part. The Wednesday evening prayer meeting at 6:45, (the first meeting will be held tomorrow evening in the college chapel,) is conducted by members of the two Christian Associations. An urgent request is given to begin now and make these meetings better this year than ever before.

Later on or in about two or three weeks Bible classes will be organized and a plan of study will at that time be outlined which will last until the Christmas holidays. The winter term will be given over to Mission study classes. So by an enumeration of some of the things that are done by the Y. M. and Y. W. it is hoped that every new student will at once see the necessity of entering this work with enthusiasm at the beginning of their college course.

Besides all this the Y. M. C. A. sent out two Deputation teams last spring to near by cities, and several calls are now in for teams this fall. Here is a splendid opportunity for any young man to make a practical use of his training. The work is done largely through the county Y. M. C. A. workers. Our own "Grandad" Angel who is now hustling things in Ionia county, has a call in for men.
