ELIGIBILITY AMENDMENT

A proposed amendment to he constitution of the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association was offered at the recent meeting of the directors that will make a radical change in the eligibility rules of the association, if it is passed at the next meeting of the board. Athletes of the association should familiarize themselves with the proposed amendment, which will probably be carried at the coming meeting. The proposed amendment follows: "Any individual who accepts remuneration for participation as a player in any form of athletics shall thereafter be ineligible to compete in any M. I. A. A. intercollegiate athletics."

While driving from Cass City to Caro last Friday an automobile carrying Edwin Boyne, Helen Grimm, and Violet Elliott, all well known at Alma, went into the ditch and all of the occupants were injured.

The driver of the automobile was killed in the accident and Miss Grimm was rendered unconscious for nearly twenty-four hours. Miss Filliott and Eddie Boyne were badly cut about the head, but suffered no other injuries. Miss Grimm's condition is still critical, but the others will soon recover.
