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ALUMNI

News has been received by the Fresbyterian Board of Foreign missions of the accidental death of Miss Beatrice Hunting in Syria, Miss Hunting was the daughter of the first president of Alma college, and was a graduate of the class of 1891. She was a member of Alpha Theta. The resolutions drawn up by the Board say in part:

"In the next two years (after her graduation) she represented the Y W. C. A. as secretary in Saginaw Michigan. In the spring o 1896 she received her appointment and was assigned to Syria.

She was stationed in Tripoli. For the larger part of the time her work has been in the Tripoli Girls' school. In the last few years Miss Hunting has devoted herself more definitely to evangelistic work among the women and girls of northern Syria. When the war broke out Miss Hunting was home on her furlough. Learning that a relief expedition was going to Palestine under the Red Cross, Miss Hunting hailed it as an opportunity to get back to the land of her love and work. She left here in 1918. . . . She came so interested in that (relief) work that the Mission arranged to locate her there definitely. . .

A late letter from there reported remarkable success. Miss Hunting has literally built her life into the work. He name will be placed with those who have received the crown of life."

Extract from a letter written by Douglas S. Franklin, a former Alma student, now in Spanish Honduras:

"Now is the canoe time on the Pine and I suppose the old river is having its annual laugh over the foolish things being said and done It is very beautiful on the Pine, but I believe that these wonderful tropical nights are still more so.

"Lots of excitement too. The revolution broke yesterday, and the air is full of bullets and "vivas."

"I am in charge of a banana plantation of about 2500 acres, so that when I am in the States and pass a Greek 's I'll have to tip my sombrero.

"Please give my best to any of the old gang that are left. If Bud Marsh is still there tell him to write to me. Tell him the hunting is fine -tigers, leopards, deer; and in fact. anything you care to shoot. Also that it is a country where a man is not dressed if he hasn't a gun swinging from his hip.

I suppose you would like to know what the women here are like. Not much. I wouldn't trade one American girl for all the Spanish women n Honduras.
