use knowledge rightly, for one is pt to think of knowledge as an abpract thing, as a tool, or even, as a

decorative senses. But the primary office of knowledge is to make people alive, for the only knowledge orth-while, is that which is capable ife. Learning and culture should experiences of every-day life, for thus one would be unable to relate know-
ledge to life. This is illustrated by the story of the college professor, who having failed to impress his au-
dience, went away thinking that his peech had been too deep for them. But in reality, the failure of the professor to elicit any response from
his audience, was due to his inability is audience, was due to his inability
o associate knowledge with terms o associate knowledge with terms
of life. The fact that the world today is
torn apart politically, industrially, torn apart politically, industrially, ders, brains and souls of the younger generation, the task of rebuild-
