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**EDITORIAL**

My Dear Mr. Editor:

You and I are not theologians and may be pardoned for an occasional mistake when we venture into the field of theology.

In your last week's issue you reprinted a statement from Fundamentalists writers which you doubtless believed authoritative on the differences between the so-called Fundamentalists and the so-called Liberals, as represented in the Presbyterian Church. This statement is characterized by Dr. Merrill of the Brick Church of New York, as so completely misrepresentative of the Liberals that he himself says that he is nearer Fundamentalism than Liberalism if the statement be accurate. Others of the conservative wing of the church have gone so far as to say that if this statement which you printed is truly Liberalism then there are no Liberalists in the Presbyterian church.

It was almost amusing at the late Assembly at Grand Rapids to hear Dr. Erdman of Princeton, Dr. Wishart of Wooster and Dr. Vance of Detroit (to use these as example) labeled "liberal", when truth compels one who knows them to call each a conservative of rather rigid sort. These and others like them stood for liberal treatment of those whose views were not their own, and certainly not the views of the McCarty-Bryan group, and for strict adherence to the historic principle that each Presbytery is first of all the judge of the fitness of the ministers within its own bounds.

It is to be regretted that men on both sides of the controversy have tried to label and perhaps (in a few cases) to stigmatize certain men, honest in conviction, on the other side. Just as I have always insisted that our opponents in athletics must not be called or thought less honest and less honorable than ourselves, so I would have our students think men on both sides sincere and would be glad to see a more perfect sportsmanship among the the theological controversialists.

Incidentally, at least 80% (some men say 90%) of the commissioners in Grand Rapids were undoubtedly conservative in theology.

I am glad that your interest and your belief that many of our students are thinking about these questions leads you to discuss them editorially.

innings, but it was the first time this year that Alma has shown that many innings of errorless baseball.

A single to right field in the fourth inning was the only blow that Kalamazoo got until the sixth, when Sam got into trouble for the only time during the game. It didn't matter much then as the game was safely on ice. In the sixth Larson singled to center. Voorhees was out on a fly to center. Brother Casey Voorhees poked one into right field that went for two sacks. Garrett whiffed the breezes, but Simmons singled to right and Larson and Casey scored. Black singled, but the agony was ended when Fleming struckout.

Alma went after the game in the opening chapter. Hunter crooked one to right. Carty grounded out, Hunter taking second. Wright kissed one to center and Hunter cashed. 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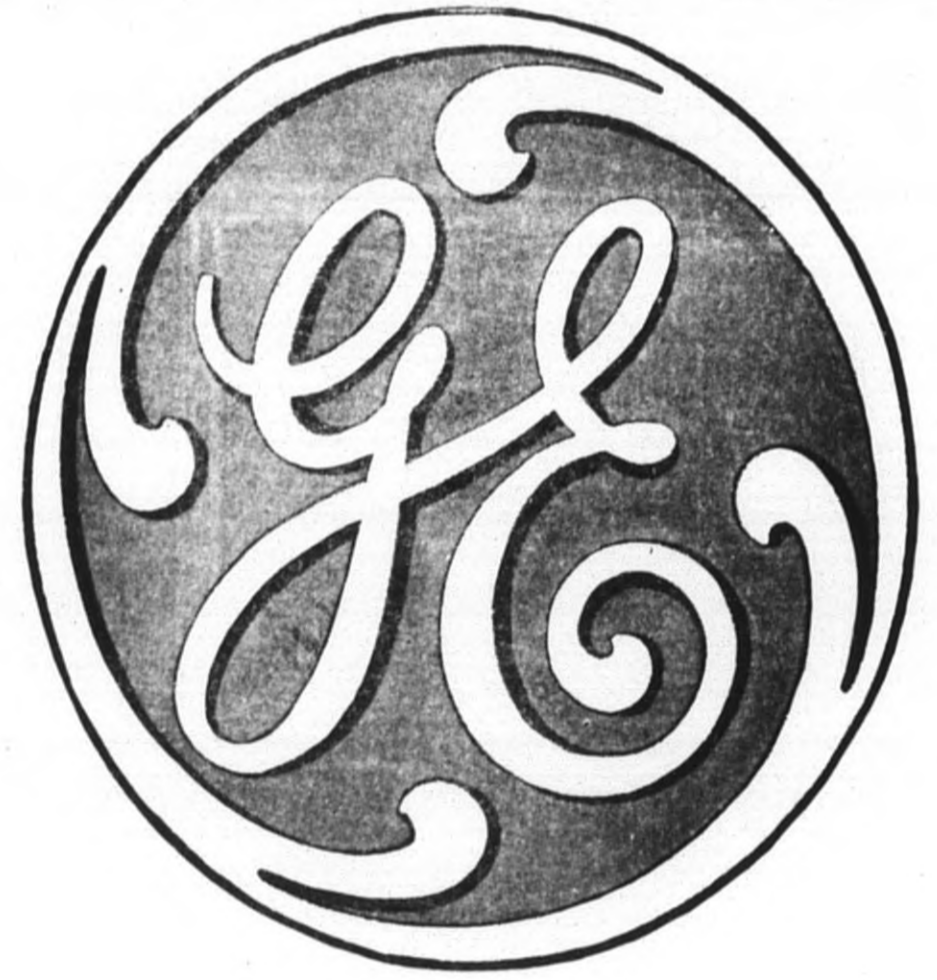

## CLIPPED

Three students of the University of Michigan have personally made and arranged a Marionette Show, and are touring the state under the head of the "Puppeteers." This fast growing model for entertainment is taken from the old form of presentation in France and Italy. One of the trio made the marionettes from wood, papier mache, cloth and paint; another operates the tiny figures from overhead and the other one of the party does the talking of the life-like creatures.

Ypsilanti will offer summer courses in sculpturing, stagecraft, and show card lettering.

Ninety-four will receive degrees at Albion college at the annual commencement exercises June 17.

Wooster College is carrying on a drive for a \$10,000 stadium which is planned to be of such size to accommodate more than 5,000 people.

Harvard is trying a new system of examination. Any helps such as books and references may be used in answering questions. Students are graded according to their ability to adapt and apply information.

The University of Paris is sponsoring a plan whereby one hundred of their students will swap homes with foreign students of other European countries for the summer vacation. It is thought that much good will be derived from it and will be very educational. English, German,

Hungarian, and Belgium Universities are all on the list for exchanges. The authorities of the University of Paris and the other schools are very enthusiastic over the growth of the movement.

The ten colleges that rank highest in the percentage of alumni listed in "Who's Who in America," according to recent figures are: Amherst, Wesleyan, Harvard, Rochester, Hamilton, Oberlin, Yale, Williams, Brown and Cornell.

Wesleyan University it to adopt the point system. Under this system each student position will count a certain number of points the maximum number being twenty-five. It is hoped that the system will be productive of higher scholarship and of the development of unrecognized ability. The plan has been adopted by many of our western colleges.

Michigan had the largest representation of all the Universities at the Student Volunteer Convention at Indianapolis. She sent 96 delegates.

Kazoo Normal will issue 600 diplomas at their commencement June 24.

The class of '24 at M. A. C. will have a water festival on the Red Cedar River to replace the annual spring term pageant. The source of entertainment will be canoe tilts, society floats, canoe races, and a band concert.
