Though having opened his office but a few months, already Dr. Moon has a practice that takes him to all parts of the city. He has fitted himself with great care for his chosen profession, having spent four years in the Detroit College of Medicine, one year in the Children's Free Hospital and one year in St. Mary's.

During his college days Dr. Moon was assistant to Dr. H. O. Walker, one of Michigan's leading authorities on surgery, and since graduation has been chosen on the staff of one of the leading maternity hospitals of the city, besides being in charge of the medical work in three of the city schools. SCHOLARSHIPS**

The interesting announcement was recently made of the awarding the Silliman and the Brownell scholarships for 1913-12 to Sidney P. Cook, '11 of Alma, and to Gladys N. Dersheu, '11, of Chicago, Ill. These scholarships have a money value which ranks them high as prizes for the attainment of the ambitious, but their chief value lies in the emphasis they put upon the fruits of the best type of College training, viz. character and scholarship. The conditions governing the award are thus stated in catalogue: "The Silliman and Brownell scholarships each amounting to \$50 in tuition, are to be awarded annually to a young man and a young woman in the Junior class, of Christian character and high ideals, who have the highest scholarship records as determined by honor points in the work of the Freshman and Sophomore years." BASKET BALL

The one big obstacle which stood in way of a winning basketball team last year has been removed and the 1913-14 squad proceed with its practice work unhampered by the faults and fallings of the College gymnasium. The High School authorities have given oral consent to the use of their gymnasium by College men and only the business end of the agreement now remains to be transacted. Since the inception of the indoor game this trouble has always stunted the proper development of basketball teams at Alma.

The material for the team is plentiful and rich in possibilities and this season should see rebirth of scientific play. Three veterans are available and a host of new men who have seen more or less of varsity or good high school experience. Will Schultz, Roy Phillips and Paul Austin will form the nucleus of a quintet. The first named is the probable choice for captain of the five and will undoubtedly play forward, pairing with Phillips. Austin will be seen at his old stand at the guard job. He was the premier basketball man produced at Alma College last year and should have as successful a season this year as last.

Alger Wood may re-enter the game this winter after a year's vacation and if he should the situation would lighten up several candles' power worth. In his freshman year he shared honors with Edgerton as the two best men in the M. I. A. A. "Pug" can play any and all positions but might be used at guard. For the pivot position "Eph" Johnson and Nisbit are the leading candidates. The former has the call over the latter considerably. Of all the men who played last year the former football captain showed the most improvement. He is an agile jumper and in spite of his size is one of the most active men on the Presbyterian court, Nisbit is new at the game but has shown sufficient merit to mark him as capable of varsity basketball.

In Spinney Alma has one of the best products of state High school basketball. As a teammate of Wood and Austin he did much to carve out the wonderful success for the Alma High quintet of '10 and '11. Spinney is a dead shot and a good passer. He plays a very good floor game too and will be a most valuable asset to the College five.

Others who will make the favorites hustle for their jobs are Oscar Anderson, Stub Vogt, McCloy and Cole.

A definite schedule has not been entirely arranged yet, but is in the process.

NEW GIFT FOR MUSEUM

The Hood Museum has recently received a collection of minerals and shells from Mr. William Winton, of the class of 1904' and now of the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company, Newark New Jersey. The collection contains some fine examples of silicified wood more commonly called petrified wood. The articles are the results of collecting from local and distant parts of the country, and will bear the donors' card, "From Mrs. Bulah Winton Sickles and William Winton.

The Museum has also recently received a piece of a fossil tusk most probably of the Mastodon, sent by Mr. Frank Bartholomew, a former student, now of Port Angeles, Washington. The tusk was found and excavated by Mr. Bartholomew, and to prevent its crumbling, it was imbedded in plaster of paris for removal from the ground and shipment.

The College greatly appreciates these gifts from those who have gone out and show their continued interest in this way. The alumni and students scattered in all parts of the Country, have often the opportunity of either sending specimens or giving information of collections and materials which may be obtained for the Museum. Such specimens or information should be sent to the Hood Museum, Alma College, Alma, Michigan, or to the College office. It is of great value to send with the materials, the name of the place where they were obtained, and such other information as is available. We are especially grateful for these recent accessions.
