Among the many Alma sons who have taken active part in the war, is highest honors it is possible to r ceive in the country's service. Leslie awarded the Distinguished Service awarded the Distinguished Service
Cross and has gained the title of Ace, having shot down several aero-
planes. His experience in this service was very interesting and remarkable. One time he was nearly taken prisoner. His plane had been shot down by the Germans and had it not
been for the sudden gains of the Allies he would have been captured. While in college Koepfgen was an
all round-athlete, probably the best that Alma has ever had. He played on all of the colleg teams, football, base ball and basketball. He also made a brilliant record in track. After being graduated from Alma he accepted a position as principal
of high school at Newberry There of high school at Newberry. There he was thought so highly of that
after one year he was made superintendent. He resigned to enter government service and was only in
service a few weeks when he was made lieutenant. He was asked to give instructions in aviation, but was so determined to go across that he soon did and his services there are
still supporting his old M. I. A. A. records.
