"This machine will perfor computations so rapidly that the recational guidance will be greated for the masses to a degree Bac and enable every boy to learn where he special aptitude lies," Prof. 1831says: "Boys might in some ristress have great aptitudes in certain directions-they might be general to special lines of activity-act-sec-s know it." Prof. Hull believes that the work with the machine will be mainly with adolescent persons from 14 to 24 years old. "As time goes on, we will get more and more sets of weight numbers to use in the tests, until the time will come when we may take a boy in the eighth grade and by means of the tests score his aptitudes for the main occupations. The boy can then take his score card, look it over and determine for himself what his pursuits will be. It will be possible to ascertain these aptitudes at a cost of 15 or 20 cents per person, whereas it now costs \$25 to obtain a very meager estimate of aptitudes."

Ten Presbyterian colleges this year showed a falling off in college attendance. Several of them were compelled to limit attendance because of inability to finance the college on a more elaborate scale. The Presbyterian Board of Christian Education is endeavoring to raise money to supplement the resources of colleges which are insufficiently endowed.

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

Continued from page 1 interested in peace, representing a membership of approximately 10,000, 000 men and women, are now affiliated in the Council in order to arouse the country to the need of prompt and intelligent action for the prevention of war; to co-ordinate their several activities for united action on a step-by-step program; and to prevent duplication of effort.

and each 5-minute overtime period played in case of ties.

The new regulations also state that in case a foul is awarded a player and, as a result, he is allowed one or more free throws, he must attempt to tally by these free throws himself or otherwise they do not count. This ruling prevents a team-mate attempting the free throws.

Time allotments for free throws are also given attention and a free throw must be attempted within 10 seconds after squaring away. This ruling is designed to prevent stalling.

Another important ruling allows officials to ignore violations in case they are made to give an advantage. For example, a shorter center might fail to place one arm behind his back in order to have the official give the ball to an opposing player out of bounds. This, while a disadvantage would be less of an advantage than to have the taller center direct thu balk to a certain position from the

Another change modifies the awarding of fouls made on a player in the act of shooting. Under the new rules a foul committed on a player in possession of the ball inside the 17 foot line gives him two free throws. A foul committed on a player outside the 17 foot line gives him one free throw, but if committed while in the act of shooting a basket, two free throws are allowed.
