New Goal of \$685,000 Set; To Be Reached June 15; Detroit Headquarters Opened.


FOB ENDOWMENT

The second stage of Alma's big endowment campaign has been entered. The original goal of \$300,000 which was to be reached by March 31, has been abandoned for, and will be included in a total of \$685,000 to be raised by June fifteenth of this year. Included in the latter sum will be \$110,000 to be raised in Alma and Gratiot county for the purpose of erecting a memorial gymnasium at the college.

Taking from the total of \$685,000 the amount to be spent for the gymnasium and a fund to cover immediate financial demands there will still be enough left to make, with the present fund of about \$450,000 practically a million dollars endowment for the institution.

The gymnasium is planned as a permanent memorial to those from Alma, and Gratiot county who served in the great war; especially will it be a memorial to the gold star heroes. From the people of Alma and Gratiot county alone, it is planned, will come the funds for erecting this building.

Aside from its character as a memorial, the new gymnasium fills a real need at Alma, not only for a place where indoor athletic contests






