years ago, in the triangle league Alma won one and lost one debate with Hope, the strongest debating organ-
ization in the ization in the M. I. A. A. Last year
the judges turned an obvious victory for Alma's Affirmative team into a
defeat. Our Negative team, how ever, was more successful winning
its contest with Olivet by a three to none decision.

ANOTHER FRENCH STUDENT Another member of the foreign le gion has arrived. The ranks are
gradually filling up. Direct from the Army of Occupation in Germany comes our new French student, Pelmont.
Pelmont's home is in Parthenay,
Deux-Sevres, France Deux-Sevres, France. He was at
tending the normal tending the normal school in his home
town when the 1919 draft caught him. He donned the blue and for three years served France. At the time of the officers' training schools he was sick, and so lost his chance of becoming a "special rations" in
1919. Three months after 1919. Three months after entering dubbed, was sent to the St . Mihie front. After the armistice he started on that famous sight seeing tour via the "hob nail express" to Deutschland. Many Almaites know about that "all up hill" forced hike to the
Rhine. In Germany Andy served regimental clerk, interpreter in the American forces at Coblenz, attache of the Divisional Commander Montbaur, and later teacher in the
army schools at army schools at Arzbach. It looks
as if Andy must have pulled $\left\lvert\, \begin{aligned} & \text { as in Andy must have pulled some } \\ & \text { wires to get all these "soft billets," } \\ & \text { but in the }\end{aligned}\right.$ but in the army its not what one gets but what one gets away with that counts.
The government decided that Andy would make a better teacher than
soldier so he was discharged in sorch so
Mare was discharged in
1921. "Heinie," however, was reluctant to pay the indemnity to France, and so President Millerand
sent for Andy sent for Andy. He was stationed for two months in the coal fields of
the Ruhr valley. In July Germany the Ruhr valley. In July Germany
decided to pay up and begin life over, and so Andy lost his job and had to return to school teaching. In August notice came unexpectedly of the scholarship by which he was enabled to
come to Alma, and he lost no time come to Alma, and he lost no time
in availing himself of the opportunit availing himself of the opportun-
ity. The Big City extended him a
royal welcome, royal welcome, and Mayor Hylan
showed him about the paten showed him about the place from the
battery to the Bronx. But, the wild
and west lured him as he longed to see
the bucking bronchos and wild Inthe bucking bronchos and wild In-
dians. So he chose Alma as the place
whin which would afford him the most excitement in this time.
