And now, having discussed the conditions and the cause, it will be well to hee strictly to the logical outline and suggest the remedy. This is simple. Let the President of the Oratorical Council take it upon himself to see that a large number of men and women begin orations at once. Then he should, to use the slang expression, get busy and "ride them," not in a leisurely fashion like a Detroit mounted policeman, but in a vicious style accompanied with a generous use of the spurs. In other words, if Alma College has to pass a selective draft act to get orators into the field, the only logical policy is to do it and do it now.

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

ANOTHER FRENCH STUDENT

Another member of the foreign legion has arrived. The ranks are gradually filling up. Direct from the Army of Occupation in Germany comes our new French student, Pel-

Pelmont's home is in Parthenay, Deux-Sevres, France. He was attending the normal school in his home town when the 1919 draft caught him. He donned the blue and for three years served France. At the time of the officers' training schools he was sick, and so lost his chance of becoming a "special rations" in 1919. Three months after entering the service "Andy" as he has been dubbed, was sent to the St. Mihiel front. After the armistice he started on that famous sight seeing tour via the "hob nail express" to Deutschland. Many Almaites know about that "all up hill" forced hike to the Rhine. In Germany Andy served as regimental clerk, interpreter in the American forces at Coblenz, attache of the Divisional Commander at Montbaur, and later teacher in the army schools at Arzbach.
