TROUNCES YPSI ALMA ELIMINATES YPSILANTI IN A SEVERELY CONTESTED

MAHUUN ELEVEN

BATTLE.

After playing almost an entire game, which saw the Maroon and Cream aggregation given penalties of upwards of a 100 yards, the Alma College football eleven smashed through the defense of the Michigan State Normals at Ypsilanti Saturday and pushed over a touchdown with just one minute to play, winning the first Michigan Intercollegiate game of the season by a score of 7 to 0, practically eliminating the Downstate Teachers from further consideration in the fight for the football championship, in which they were acknowledged contenders. The defeat of their team was a great surprise to the Ypsi fans, who had counted upon an easy win.

Early in the game the Teachers looked dangerous, and twice during the first half got within scoring distance. Once the Green eleven pushed its way almost to the Alma goal, but the Maroon and Cream aggregation the counting station and then punted the mark.

During the first quarter Alma had slightly the better of the Teachers, but in the second session the Maroon and Cream team was outplayed.


