Prominent Alumnus Speaks in Chapel

Hon. T. E. Johnson, a graduate of Alma college, and now Superintendent of Public Instruction in this state, spoke at the chapel service Wednesday morning.

Mr. Johnson pointed out the three pursuits that men have always followed-that of the individual, that of God, and that of beauty. The pursuit of individual gain, if not extended to selfishness, is a worthy goal. It incites men to do better work in order that they may gain the things they most need and want. Some men have this one pursuit.

The pursuit of God is surely worthy, and probably more noble than the pursuit of the individual. Many men have thought of nothing else, and have found not only personal gain through it, but the satisfaction of service to others.

The pursuit of beauty is age-old, and is instilled into everyone. We all like beautiful things although few are willing to make them the one goal of their lives. This is a

Vachel Linsay, Poet,

Probably the greatest treat the college has had this year was that of hearing Vachel Lindsay read some of his own poems last Wednesday evening at the Presbyterian church. Mr. Lindsay is a native of Springfield, Illinois, and has gained fame not only in this country but abroad for his work.

His first selection was his "Going To The Sun," which was based on the story of the ancient and wicked city of Babylon. It was in the rendering of this verse that we first gained an understanding of the manner in which Mt. Lindsay believes poetry should be read. He believes that it should be read with the thought in mind that some distant voice-unlike the human voice-is reciting it; and his reading was not carried on in ordinary tones, but rather in tones which varied with the spirit of the poem and best brought out the feeling.

Gives Alma Treat NINE ACRE GIFT

The Bahlkes' Great Christmas Gift of Adjoining Property Announced at Banquet.

Mr. and Mrs. William A. Bahlke propose to give the college as a Christmas gife a new athletic field of eight or nine acres.

Announcement of this gift was the high spot of the football banquet last Friday night. President Crooks asked Coach Campbell to read what he called a "beautifully worded" letment was of this gift and was received with the enthusiasm the magnificent benefaction deserved.

The tract to be given, comprises eight or nine acres and extends north and east of the new Memorial gymnasium. The north line is the same as the line of the fence at the north end of the tract of woods owned by the college known as "the jungle," and runs from the jungle five hundred and seventy-seven feet to the railroad. The south line runs from Cedar avenue to Linden avenue, 667 feet. From south to north the distance is 511 feet. The field

Dear President Crooks:

We have had in mind for some time to convey to the college Athletic Association of Alma College, the lands we now own lying to the north and east of the college gymnasium for an athletic field. It is our view that this property is particularly well adapted, both in location and form, for such a purpose. This land consists of between eight and nine acres.

We propose to make a gift of this property to Alma College for the above purpose, in case the college sees fit to accept it from us. The title is perfect, except for two lots. The cost of plotting, sewer, and ia. drain taxes, and all other taxes have been paid or will be paid by us. The property is without incumbrance.

We shall be pleased to make a Christmas gift of this land for the use of the athletic department of your college as soon as you indicate your willingness to accept it. It is with great pleasure that we do this. The interest and enthusiasm shown in the athletic work of the college, and particularly the recent successes deserve this, recognition from

With best wishes for the success of the Athletic Association and with an earnest belief that by this action we will advance the interest in this department of your work, we re-
