EDITORIAL

Honor System

As shown by the balloting last Wednesday, the student body is not in favor of the adoption of the Honor System in Alma College. The proposition was literally snowed under by a vote which was almost two to one aaginst it.

The editorial staff of the Almanian feels a little bit elated about the results, since it has been a part of their editorial policy to oppose the system and its adoption in Alma. How much credit we can claim for the attitude manifested in the voting will, of course, remain a question which cannot be settled, but we feel that our stand made some impression upon the minds of the students. This supposition seems more plausible when it is remembered that last spring all the agitation heard on the campus in favor of the Honor System. Thus, there has been a complete reversal in the attitude of the student body toward the plan.

This realization gives us new heart. We are almost forced to believe that the editorials are sometimes read, and that they do some good. Perhaps there is a place for a college paper after all. We must confess that there were many times during the college year just past when we were sorely tempted to leave a blank space under the masthead, believing that the editorial column would never be missed.

What a calamity it would have been had we not had the little discussions of the Honor System in this column. Perhaps some would have been at a loss as to how to vote.

It is a wonderful thing to be able to mold young minds by a few wellchosen words and pharses, to guide them aright and make life's pathways they will doubtless establish a suma little less stony.

Seriously-we were very glad to see the vote go as it did, because it shows that the students are thinking seriously about the question and have made up their minds that an imperfectly working Honor System is worse than none at all. They have realized, it seems, that a successful system must be backed by tradition. The attitude taken by the students speaks well for their intelligence. In a few years Alma College may be ready for an Honor System, and when that time comes, the students themselves will adopt it and make it work.

To the newly elected staff for the Almanian of 1928-29, we extend heartiest congratulations and best wishes for the year to come. It is a somewhat novel circumstance when the editor wishes his business manager much success in the editor's position. We feel that both Mr. Mann and his confrere, Barlow, are particularly fitted for the positions. Mr. Mann should do very will in his capacity as business manager. He has a very pleasing personality, and should be able to wheedle ads out of the most conscientious objector to collegiate advertising on the street (newspaper term for the business district).
