

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

lighting equipment is to be supplied

by the General Electric Company. The campanile is a fift of Charles Coughlin of Milwaukee, a graduate of the college. The 37-foot Bedford stone chamber immediately relow the beacon light houses a set of electricallyoperated chimes used to call students to classes, play concerts, and sound the hours with Westminster peals. The 24-foot Bedford stone base of the tower is to be floodlighted with white light. The tower proper, between the base and the white dome, is of red brick, the general architecture conforming with that of the Lincoln Memorial Library and the Coolidge Sylvan Theater nearby on the campus. The chimes tower was designed by Perkins and McWayne, Sioux Falls; the contractors are the Wold-Mark Construction Company of Brookings and the Aberdeen Engineering Company of Aberdeen.
