EASTER BREAKFAST HELD ON SUNDAY

An annual Easter morning breakfast at Wright Hall, Sunday morning, to which the student body, faculty and others interested in the college were invited was sponsored by the Y. W. C. A. of the college.

The tables were arranged in the form of an "E" and extended the entire length of the dining room. They were decorated in a yellow and green color scheme. Yellow tapers and candlesticks with green candles were placed at intervals on the table. Brightly colored eggs in nests of green, yellow and orange with toy bunnies and carts carried out the Easter idea. Yellow and green nut cups filled with many colored Easter candies were set at each place. Bouquets of yellow tulips and pink and yellow snapdragons and a large bouquet of pussy willows completed the decorations. Incidentally we must not omit the "swipes" in their pink and gold caps without whom the affair would certainly not have been a success.

Miss Margaret McMillan played a piano solo "In A Monastery Garden" while the faculty, guests, and students took their places. Dr. Crooks read a few verses of scripture and gave the invocation after which Professor Ewer led in the singing of the Easter hymn "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today". Professor Ewer then sang "The Palms", accompanied by Miss Roberts. After the breakfast was served Mr. Robert King sang "Blessed Saviour" accompanied by Miss Florence McCallum.

The menu consisted of: fresh grape fruit, fried ham and eggs, rolls, jelly, doughnuts and coffee.
