

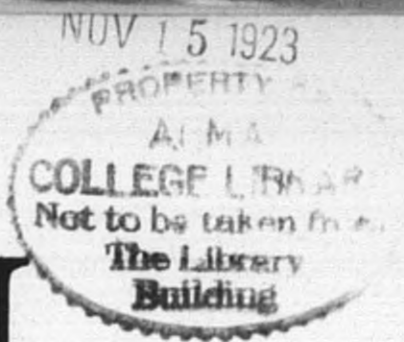

FINAL PLANS MADE FOR HOMECOMING ALBION OVERCOME IN FINAL QUARTER

ANNUAL REUNION SET FOR SATURDAY

Possible Championship Makes Kazoo Fray Big Feature of Homecoming.

Home-coming day, November 17, will undoubtedly be a prominent landmark in this year's history of Alma College. A season of athletic success not equalled for years in the past, the general era of expansion, cannot fail to draw back Alma's loyal sons and daughters to the scene of struggles and hard work but nevertheless of fond remembrances. There is a choice menu to tempt the mental appetites of the Home-comers. The afternoon will be given a little speed on its way by an exhibition of scrimmage practice on the part of the football squad. "Kazoo" will replace the second team for this last practice since the men on the team do not wish to tire themselves for the activities of the evening. After the football men have had time to knock the dust from their raiment and to change them for more suitable attire the major part of the population of the college with the guests of honor for the day will disperse in order to partake of gastronomic delights of the evening. Zeta Sigma does court honors of the evening by giving their annual masculine and feminine banquet. Phi Phi Alpha, Beta Tau Epsilon, and Delta Kappa have put off the delights of the "eternal feminine" for the present and will content themselves with stags. That will end the events of a strenuous day. These are not the main reasons why old grads should come back. The students of the college have a hearty desire to meet the people who have upheld Alma's reputation in the past and these old grads may sleep with visions of a welcome which will warm the very cockles of their hearts from every student and Prof on November 7.

Saturday will be featured by the annual home-coming of Alumni and old students of Alma College, and one of the things of interest for the week end will be the Kalamazoo-Alma College Michigan Intercollegiate struggle, which will bring to a close the M. I. A. A. season as far as the Maroon and Cream is concerned.

Unfortunately Kalamazoo College is not represented by as strong an aggregation as usual this year, making it practically a foregone conclusion that Alma will tumble the Celery City eleven, which may take some of the interest from the game. One thing is to be looked for Saturday, however, that being a Kalamazoo team that can and will fight. Kalamazoo teams have that reputation and this Kalamazoo team, although weaker than usual, has a bunch of men who will fight the entire game. Even in defeat there is something to admire about a fighting team that won't quit. Kalamazoo has been one of Alma's greatest association rivals for the past several years and will try harder against Alma than any other association school.

The Maroon and Cream has the high scoring team of Michigan right now in collegiate football circles and it hopes to maintain that record throughout the balance of the season. It is an honor and credit to be known as the best scoring machine of a state and the eleven is determined to fight for that honor.

Alma's Warriors, Outweighed 20 Pounds to the Man, Put Over Lone Counter.

Showing a wonderful varied line of attack, with the finest overhead attack that the Michigan Intercollegiate has seen during the entire season, and a defense of superb power, the light Maroon and Cream football team outplayed the powerful Albion College eleven Saturday and when the final whistle blew, just after Albion had been held for downs a single yard from the Alma goal line, Presbyterians were returned victors by a score of 6 to 0, practically assuring Alma of the Michigan Intercollegiate championship.

Alma, in victory, has only the highest of praise for her defeated foe. Albion fought as only Albion teams can fight and it was not until just before the gruelling struggle ended, with the battered, crippled, sorely-tried Almites grimly holding Albion for downs just short of the stripe that meant a tie game or an Albion win, was a victory truly assured for the Campbellites. Against any other team not as full of determination to win as was the Maroon and Cream, Albion would have won. And credit—plenty of it—must go to the fallen foe.

The great Albion defense three times turned back the fighting, slashing Alma attack within the Albion five yard line, during the first half, during which time it seemed that Alma was certain to cash two or three touchdowns. During this time the Albionites could make no headway against the sturdy Alma defense, getting just one first down. But still the Miller men did not falter, and the second half saw them fight back more determined than in the opening chapter.

First Quarter

Before the largest crowd that ever saw a game in the Michigan Intercollegiate, Albion kicked off to Shaver on the Alma 25 yard line. "Cuddy" made a 25 yard return to the 50 yard line. Alma fumbled on the first play and Harley recovered. Lamb made a yard and McDonald tore thru for 9 and first down. Albion was offside. McDonald hit the line for 4 and Lamb added 3. McDonald made it first down by inches. H. Catherman added 2 more. Alma was penalized 15 for holding. Elias went around end for 17 yards. A pass Elias to McDonald made 11 yards and first down. Elias made 1½ and McDonald added a half yard. Elias lost 8 and then Albion recovered an attempted field goal, getting the ball on her own 25 yard line. Albion held and took a 15 yard penalty. Tamblin made 3. H. Williams was stopped in his tracks and Eastman punted to McDonald on the Albion 37 yard mark. Catherman in two tries gave 1½ yards. A pass grounded. A pass Elias to McDonald gave 7 yards, but lacked first down and it was Albion's ball. V. Williams failed to gain. H. Williams got 2½. Tamblin made 3, and Albion was forced to punt, Catherman returning 10 yards to the 50 yard mark. McDonald made 7 and Catherman added 2½. McDonald after failing to gain made it first down on the second attempt. Catherman lost 8. Elias made it back with extra yard. A pass Elias to Wright gave 11 yards and first down. Lamb made 2 and Elias 8 as the quarter ended. Score Alma 0, Albion 0.

Second Quarter

Harger replaced Howell at end and Bedient went to full for H. Williams for Albion. Welthoelter replaced Lamb at half for Alma. Catherman failed to gain. A pass Elias to Carty made it first down on the 4 yard line. H. Catherman made 2. McDonald could not smash down the Albion defense and failed to gain. Lamb was held without a gain. McDonald launched a heavy (Continued on page two)

drive on the final down, but could get only a yard against the Methodists defense, and it was Albion's ball on her own 1 yard line. Eastman punted to H. Catherman on the 39 yard line. Weltholder recovered a fumble for a 6 yard loss. Lightbody intercepted an Alma pass and was down on the Albion 40 yard mark. Bedient failed to gain. V. Williams got 6. Elias grabbed an Albion pass out of the aid and raced 40 yards to the Albion 6 yard line, where he fell after being thrown off his balance by an Albion tackler. McDonald made 3. Alma was off side and took a 5 yard penalty. Weltholder made a 1/2 yard. McDonald got a yard. A pass behind the Albion goal was grounded and it was Albion's ball on her own 20. Griffin replaced Lightbody at quarter for Albion. V. Williams made 10 for Albion's first down. Bedient lost a yard. Albion held and took a 15 yard penalty. Eastman punted to Catherman, who returned the ball 15 yards to the Alma 45. McDonald and Catherman failed to gain. Alma was penalized 15 for holding. R. Catherman replaced H. Catherman. Weltholder failed to gain. A pass grounded and Alma punted the receiver being downed on his own 35 yard line without a gain. Fisher replaced Tamblin at half for Albion. A pass Fisher to V. Williams gave 9. Half ended. Score Alma 0, Albion 0.

Third Quarter

It was found that the brilliant McDonald had played almost all of the quarter with a badly dislocated shoulder, and much against his will he was forced out of the game, Lankton replacing him. Burton went in for Calkins and H. Catherfor R. Catherman. Albion sent Lightbody back into the fray for Griffin.

Albion kicked off to H. Catherman on the 3 yard line. Harley made a 15 yard return. Lankton went back of the goal to punt, and Albion was downed with the 83 yard kick on her own 30 yard line, after a 13 yard return. Lightbody lost 2 yards and Eastman punted to Catherman who returned 10 yards to the Albion 45. Alma fumbled and Carty recovered the ball for a 6 yard loss. A pass was grounded. Elias shot a pass to Wright, which an Albion man deflected in the attempt to ground it and when Anderson grabbed the ball out of the air for a completed pass it gave Alma 10 yards. Lankton attempted a dropkick, which went wide of the mark and on the play Albion was penalized 15 for roughing the kicker and it was still Alma's ball with first down. A pass Elias to Carty gave 7 yards and a second Elias to Shaver netted 17, putting the ball on the Albion 15 yard line. Elias failed to gain. Weltholder made 1 and a pass Elias to Shaver gave 6. A dropkick failed. Lightbody grabbing the ball when the kick was blocked and carrying it to the 45 yard line for the longest run that Albion made. A pass Tamblin to Williams, after Tam replaced Fisher, gave Albion 20 yards. Bedient made 6, Albion was offside. R. Catherman replaced H. Catherman. Albion attempted a dropkick from the 23 yard line after a third down failed to give the needed yardage. It was blocked Alma getting the ball. Weltholder lost 4 yards. Reid replaced Wright and Alma was penalized half the distance to her goal. Lankton punted from behind his goal to the Albion 7 yard line. Albion made 3 and then added 2 more. Giffin's pass was good for 20. A linesman netted 3 just as the quarter ended. Score Alma 0, Albion 0.

Fourth Quarter

Albion failed to gain on the next play and then tried a pass which was grounded. On the fourth down a pass grounded behind the goal and it was Alma's ball on her own 20 yard line. Lankton failed to gain. On the next 2 plays Lankton smashed the line for 9 1/2. He then punted to the Albion 20 yard line, where Tarrant recovered the ball after it

had been touched by an Albion player. Three passes failed and a dropkick was blocked, Partee recovering for Alma. Elias made 4 and then carried the ball out of bounds. Elias passed to Carty for 10 yards and first down. Elias made 3 yards. Lamb replaced Lankton. A pass R. Catherman to Carty gave Alma first down on the 4 yard line. Lamb smashed through a great hole opened in the Albion line for the lone touchdown of the game. Carty's attempted by dropkick for the extra point failed. Score Alma 6, Albion 0.

Alma kicked to Albion, Elias making the kick and then going down and nailing the receiver in his tracks as he took the ball on the Albion 30. Barlow replaced Olsen. Two plays gave little yardage and Albion punted. Alma immediately returned the kick. Three passes in a determined effort to score were grounded in order. Albion attempted a dropkick, which was partly blocked, but she recovered the ball on the 15 yard line. A linesman failed and a pass over the goal was grounded. Courturi replaced Partee. It was Alma's ball on the Alma 20. Alma was penalized 15 for holding. A short punt gave Albion the ball on the Alma 25. Bentley replaced Couturi. Alma grounded two passes and then grounded another over the goal, and it was Alma's ball on the 20. Alma was offside. Alma punted. Huntley replaced Lamb. Albion started a determined drive for the goal by linesmashing and carried the ball to the 5 yard line. Gaining four yards in three plays Albion launched a fourth play for a touchdown to tie or win. Albion was stacked up in her tracks by the rapidly weakening, but no less determined Alma warriors, and it was Alma's ball just as the final whistle blew.

No Alma stars in the great battle can be, or could be justly picked. Every Alma man did his level best and gave everything that he had to the cause of the Maroon and Cream. Alma fight was the winner, and to every man goes only the greatest of praise for being victors in the hardest fought struggle that the M. I. A. A. has ever seen. And the great work of Coach Campbell throughout the season in developing this great eleven must not be overlooked. To him must be given great credit. He has returned his Alma Mater to the top.
