The dimensions of the building will be fifty-five feet long, thirty-three feet wide, and twenty-five feet high. It will be of plain Colonial architecture, red common brick on the outside and a lighter colored face brick on the inside walls. The ground floor and the roof will be constructed of concrete. By dint of much hard work it has proved itself an organization of the highest merit. Professor Ewer and the members of the Band throughout the years of its existence have spent a great deal of energy and time to pull the project through. The college has been proud of the accomplishments of the Band, proud of mits musical ability, proud of its snappy appearance-in a passive sort of way.

The student body has never given the Band the cooperation it deserves. We have paid our dimes for the little tags when members buttonholded us for help to send them to a foreign football field; we have cheered lustily at mass meetings and at games whenever the Band played one of the school songs, but beyond that we have never bothered ourselves. They have struggled along on almost nothing, and have asked for very little. Last year the Student Council had the band uniforms cleaned and gave the group money to buy music with, khich kas very nice of them. But why should the Band, a campus organization rendering a very definite service, have to beg money to take care of its uniforms? Why shouldn't the Band get a slice of the Student Activity Fee, and be independent in finance? The Student Council has to hunt for places to spend their appropriation and the Band could very easily use a definite amount of money each year. It would be infinitely easier for the officers if they had a certain amount of money issued them at the beginning of each semester, to plan from and with. It seems to us that it is time that the Band receives its proper recognition as a campus organization, needing and worthy of the support which it requires.

The Band as a whole needs to be recognized by the student body; the Band as individuals does not. It has been suggested that sweaters be awarded bandmen for certain service, a sort of prize, as it seems to us. On this sweater would be an "A" of some description, with the word "Band," placed upon it. Tradition has always held that an "A" showed that the wearer had made a varsity team, and had represented his school in competition against other colleges. It has meant that in a certain line he had made himself so proficient that he was able to win his right to represent Alma over a number of other students who had contested his right. It has meant success in com-

petitive sport. A bandman either has the ability to play or he hasn't. It is not developed by competition. Nor is he called on to pit his ability against the bands of other schools, except ir rivalry on a football field. 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
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#### Alma Defeated Toledo

three more in the final chapter of the argument.

In the third period Hawthorne scored the first when he went off end and then reversed the field twice on his way to the Toledo goal. Frazier made a bad pass back on the try for the extra point, the ball being way high. Hawk jumped up knocked the ball down, grabbed the leather and skirted around end and across the line for the point, making it 7 to 0. A few minutes later he grabbed a punt in midfield and raced down the field through the Toledo outfit to the goal for a touchdown.

In the closing period of the fray Karpp was the first to score, taking a pass from Hawthorne and racing 30 yards to the goal. Lamb soon added the fourth touchdown. He returned a punt 55 yards to the Toledo 5 yard line and on the second play carried it over. Gilbert scored the final touchdown going around end 15 yards, the entire Toledo team being taken off its feet on the play by the Alma blockers.

Coach Campbell used two complete teams, except for a quarterback, Karpp being the one man to play the entire game. Karpp, Hawthorne, Arozian, Veeder, Erickson, Holdship and Conlen are all deserving of considerable credit for their work in the game.

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

booths in a restaurant or soda fountain, separated by partitions. Each booth will have its table, its chairs and its equipment for four to six students. Thus the stack room will have a seating capacity of from sixty to ninety persons. The passageway from the library to the stack room will be provided with fireproof doors. There will be a book lift or elevator for the library staff incorporated in the construction. It is expected that the present building will be used entirely as reading room space, with two or three offices for the Librarian and her staff. The reading room, as proposed, will have a capacity far in excess of a hundred.

Excavations for the foundations has already started and work will go ahead on the addition as fast as possible. When the building is completed it will furnish room for all the volumes which have been so crowded in the old stack room, and will still have room for an expansion in years to come
