44 to Hear Talks by Kagawa Today

Students and Faculty Accept Kazoo's Invitation.

Forty-four students and faculty members are taking advantage of the invitation of Kalamazoo College to attend the lectures given by Dr. Toyohiko Kagawa today. Dr. Kagawa will speak in the Kalamazoo College Chapel at ten o'clock in the morning, at the Methodist Church in the afternoon, and the Western State College Gymnasium at night.

The invitation came to President Crooks from Dr. Goodsell, acting president of Kalamazoo. A special committee of the Student Council headed by Alfred Fortino arranged for the transportation of the group, but due to the lack of cars a way down to Kalamazoo could not be found for nine students desiring to attend the speeches.

Dr. Kagawa is a famous Japanese Christian leader and sociologist and the author of over ninety books on his social welfare ideas and on religion. He will speak in the Kalamazoo College Chapel at a special assembly of students from Kalamazoo and those invited from all the colleges in Southwestern Michigan on the subject: "What Christ Means to Me."

His life has been one in which he put into practice what he preached. He moved from a university rooming house to a hovel in the slums in order to most effectively get his message to the people who really needed it.

He was permitted entrance into this country on three rather interesting conditions: Not to shake hands with anybody; Not to sleep in private homes, but in hotels; To have a personal physician constantly with him.

The chapel program will be in charge of the student committee on religious activities.

Drama Club Seeks Sponsor For Annual Spring Play

During the past few weeks the Drama Club have been working on a plan to have some Saginaw organization sponsor their annual spring play, and under this arrangement to give a presentation on a local stage and a second presentation in Saginaw.

Week's Intramural Games Fail to Change Standings

Devaney's Frosh Come From Behind to Take Boat's Team.

The standings of the boys' intramural basketball league were changed little during the past week with Devaney's frosh still maintaining a firm grip on first place and Vitek's Vultures winning two games to hold third place alone. Three of the games were won on forfeits while some of the teams were inactive in the fifth round of play.

The standout game of the week was the last minute fight that the Destroyers had to make to defeat Floyd Boat's sophomores. The sophs were ahead at the end of the third quarter and it took ten points with about five minutes to play to keep Devaney's team at the top of the standings with a still unbroken record. It was the best game of basketball to be seen in the present intramural season with both teams at full strength and each playing a good passing game. Two men from each team stood out as the best offensive players in the game. Chuck Humiston and Angie MacGarvah with 12 and 10 points respectively were the backbone of the Devaney offense while Jake Miller and Ralph Daniels made 10 and 9 points for the sophs.

Vitek Wins Two

Both of the Vitek games turned out to be a resumption of the scoring contest which Cy Lewis and Bruce York are having to determine the league high-point man. In Tuesday's game with Boat's outfit York ran wild to score 21 points to establish a season record for the best individual scoring attempt in a single game. Lewis trailed his teammate with 11 markers. The game score was 34-15 in favor of the Vultures.

Thursday's game with Bob Adams' freshmen started out to be a tight game with the score tied at 8-8 at halftime. In the second half both teams played an entirely different type of game. Adams' team failed to guard with the result that the taller seniors controlled the tip-off and used it to good advantage to turn the game into the most decisive beating handed out to any team this season. The score, 43-16. In this game Lewis turned the tables on York and took shot after shot with the result that he made 18 points to 8 for York.

Lewis Still High Scorer

These two games put the boys well at the top of the individual scoring with Lewis leading York by nine points. Lewis 72, York 63. Three games were lost by the forfeit route. Bell's Rangers won from the Faculty, Schiefley won from Cash Lea's sophomores, as did Currie's frosh.

Phi Sigma Pi Vote in Wilma Wright

Ludwig, Battles, MacDonald Are Also Eligible.

The active members of Phi Sigma Pi, local honor society, voted to take Miss Wilma Wright to fill the one vacancy and to make Fred Battles, Russell Ludwig and Allen MacDonald eligible for an alumni membership upon graduation, provided their present record of character and scholarship is maintained.

All four were eligible at the present time, but membership from any one class is limited to one-eighth of the graduating body, which permitted the society to take in only one more from the senior class.

Miss Wright, senior from Carson City, has an average of 2.6, just meeting the requirement since she has attended Alma for only five semesters. The formal and public initiation will take place sometime this week.

The other members of Phi Sigma Pi are Claude Knight, president; Luther Evans, vice-president; Constance Clack, secretary; Arthur Boynton, Helen Kellogg, Mae Nelson, and Opal Hines. The faculty members are President Crooks, Dr. MacCurdy, Prof. Brokenshire, Prof. Clack, Prof. Kaufmann, and Prof. Ditto.

There are more either members or eligible for membership this year than any time since the society began in 1928. Since its beginning there have been fifty-seven persons initiated into Phi Sigma Pi, of which forty-nine are now alumni members.

The scholastic requirements are graduated. Anyone with an average of 2.75 at the beginning of his fifth semester at Alma is eligible; then it is 2.6 at the beginning of the sixth; 2.5 at the seventh, and a 2.35 at the beginning of the eighth semester or for an alumni membership. In addition to the minimum scholastic requirements there are certain character requirements determined by the faculty nucleus in the society.

This fellowship, granted annually by the University of Michigan around the first of April, entitles the student to three hundred dollars and one year in graduate school with tuition and fees paid.

The men's district oratorical contest, preliminary to the State finals, will be held in the Alma College Chapel at eight o'clock, Friday, March 6th. There will be five orations delivered during the evening.

Due to the fact that there were only three women entering from this division, they will automatically go to the State finals, for the winners of the first three places in the divisional contest are qualified to enter the state meet.

In the men's contest this Friday there will be representatives from Hope, Alma, Calvin, Michigan State, and Western State according to an announcement made yesterday by Prof. Hamilton, who is in charge of this division.

Hugh Brenneman will be Alma's entry in the contest this Friday and will give his oration entitled, "Gilded Edjicated". Miss Betty Mackie will give her oration, "Forgotten Women" next week.

The State contest will take place in Kalamazoo on the night of March 13th, one week from this Friday. The winner of the first three places in the two divisions this week will meet at that time.

These contests will be judged by the directors of speech from the institutions represented.

Scot Cagers End Season at Olivet

Comets Defeat Alma's Team 50-25 Last Friday.

The Scots closed a very unsuccessful basketball season last Friday as the Olivet Comets took a temporary lead in the MIAA basketball race by winning easily 50-25.

While the Olivet fans were hoping that their team would reach 50 points in the closing minutes of the game, Coach Argyle sat on the sidelines urging his lads to reach at least 20 points. Both teams reached their objective, although Alma reached in first.

Spankie Carter dropped in two baskets in succession and Riley Block followed it with one to give the Scots 25 points. With less than a minute to go, Stan Arthurs dropped in a basket from the side to give his team 49 points. Almost immediately big Ed Novak swung around to swish in a pivot shot, but was cut down to size by Mel Fuller. As he missed the first shot, the crowd groaned, as only one try was expected. He then dropped in the second try to reach the halfway mark.

The game started up very slow, as the Comets failed to get under way in their championship form. With the score 7-5 for the Comets, Novak and Arthurs suddenly came to life in the fleeting moments of the first half with three baskets apiece, and with the aid of Swarthout and Crawford, raised the ante to 22-7 for the first half.

The Comets got the first three baskets after resuming the contest and so the Scots dropped their fourth game in five years on the Olivet home court.

Ed Novak equalled his record of 22 points scored against Alma last year with 10 baskets and 2 free throws last Friday. Arthurs and Crawford followed with 16 and 9 points. Riley Block headed the Alma five with 8 points. The Scots, however, won in one department of the game by sinking 9 out of 16 free throws, while the best the Comets did was 4 out of 13 attempts.

Alma Debaters Meet M.S.C. Before Grange Last Friday

With two debates behind them, Robert Sayles and Thomas Nurnberger went after bigger game Friday when they met Michigan State College in a debate before a grange audience near Ithaca, February 28.

The two colleges were guests of the grange at a dinner after which Alma defended the negative against the attacks of the State affirmative. The debate centered on the two issues "Shall the powers of declaring acts unconstitutional be taken away from the Supreme Court," and "Shall these powers be given to Congress?" The debate was non-decision.

This is the first of two debates scheduled with Michigan State before grange audiences. The next is to be held near DeWitt, Michigan, on the 14th of March.

Last year both Alma's negative and affirmative defeated the Michigan State debaters.

Alma Host to 4 High School Teams This Week

Alma College was host to four high school basketball teams during the past week. The visiting schools were Edmore, Charlotte, Merrill, and Frederick. Games were played between these teams and the Alma frosh or intramural teams.

Last Monday night the frosh defeated Edmore in a game played after the Alma-Albion tilt. The following day the yearlings completed their schedule with a 34 to 27 victory over the Charlotte team, which is coached by Malcolm Gobel, an Alma alumnus.

Wednesday afternoon Devaney's Destroyers, leading intramural team, outplayed the fast Merrill high school boys to win 29-16. Harold Stacey was high point man for the victors with five baskets and a foul throw for a total of 11 points.

On Saturday afternoon the Frederick high school basketballers mixed with the Vitek team and decisively outplayed and outscored the college senior team, 29-18. After a fairly close first half the Frederick boys stepped out to make 16 points to the Vultures' 8 in the last two quarters.

Stillwagon, center on the high school outfit took the scoring honors with eleven points, while Bruce York led his teammates with 10 markers.

Albion Five Takes Scots in Last Home Game 54-36

A fast-breaking, sharp-shooting Albion College five shot into town Monday night and left with a 54-36 victory over the luckless Scots. The loss was the eighth in the MIAA for the Scots and places them the lowest since Coach Campbell returned to Alma College in 1921.

Albion showed an offense that was strictly a five man team in the first half, and had the Scots' tied 34-12 at the intermission. Leigh Prettyman was the big man in the attack with six baskets and two free throws for the evening's total of 14 points. Mel Fuller of the lowly Scots, came through in the final 20 minutes to lead the Scots with 12 points. Russ Kroeze, Jim Rouman, and Paul Santini ably supported Prettyman with points, while Eddie King, the all MIAA guard, stood out like a veteran on defense.

Clyde Dave pushed his total of personal fouls to 29 in 9 MIAA games, which is an average of over 3 per game.

Funeral Rites Held for Mrs. Ewing Wednesday

Residents of the city, members of the Alma College faculty and the student body assembled Wednesday of last week to pay a last tribute of esteem to Mrs. John T. Ewing, for whom funeral rites were held at her home that afternoon.

Interment was made at Riverside Cemetery, where Mrs. Ewing rests beside her husband, the late Dr. John T. Ewing, and three sons, Ernest, Hubert, and William. Pallbearers were Prof. Mitchell, Prof. Hamilton, Dr. MacCurdy, Dr. Rands, Prof. Brokenshire, and Prof. Ditto.

Block Takes Individual Scoring Honors

Carl Gussin led the individual scoring two years in succession, 1930-1931, but from the foul line he averaged less than .500 with 24 free throws in 51 attempts. In three years, Norman Borton was successful in 43 of his 85 attempts. Dawson, for a high scorer, had the best average of the three with a .610 rating, 61 out of 100. Riley Block led the Scots' scoring in 1936 with 73 points in the 10 MIAA games. He was successful in 17 of his 37 attempts from the foul circle. After making 10 out of 19 in 1934, he slumped badly the last two years for an average of .450. Over a period of 7 years, the Scots tried 936 shots from the foul line in 70 games and made 504 for an average of .540.

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**Programs Given At Lapeer
By Publicity Department**

Group Entertains High School in Morning; Broadcast at 7:30.

Broadcasting over station WMPC and with entertainment programs before the junior and senior high schools at Lapeer, Mich., the publicity department opened its new program Friday, February 28.

The programs for the junior and senior high schools were given before an assembly audience in the morning, with Hugh Brenneman acting as master of ceremonies. The first speaker on the program was Professor Roy W. Hamilton, who gave a short talk emphasizing the demand in modern times for preparation for life, and the part that a college played in providing an adequate preparation.

Bailey, Erickson Perform

Introduced as the "Mystery Man, Master of Legerdemain," Sandy Lee Bailey, senior, turned the audience into gales of laughter and brought thunderous demands for an encore with his feats of magic.

"Cac" Erickson, supplied the climax of the entertainment with his stories, songs and sound effects with his mouth organ. He was so well liked that the audience refused to cease their applause until he returned and gave them the "Wreck of the Old 97".

Debaters Broadcast

After the program the interested seniors were asked to remain for a conference at which Professor Hamilton spoke to them intimately about college life and prospects and values to demand from a college. Bailey said a few words in behalf of Alma from his personal experience.

Alma College went on the air at 7:30 o'clock over WMPC, in a debate, when Judge Crampton introduced Ralph Daniels, sophomore debater, who spoke for 15 minutes on the affirmative side of the state collegiate debate question. Richard Neville, freshman, was the speaker for the the negative, performing before the "mike" for 15 minutes. They debated the question "Resolved: that congress shall be empowered by a 2-3 vote to override decisions of the supreme court rendering congressional acts unconstitutional."

Judge Cramp'on then presented the final speaker for Alma, Hugh Brenneman, who delivered his oration "Git Educated." Brenneman was the winner in the men's division of the president's annual oratorical contest held recently.



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**"IT'S TOASTED" - Your throat protection
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"Security is Europe's Plea Today," Says Dean Mitchell

"Security is the desperate plea of frightened Europe today," declared Dean Mitchell speaking before the International Relations Club last Thursday.

Starting with the peace conferences concluding the World War, Dean Mitchell traced the attempts of the major European countries to make themselves secure from aggression, particularly from Germany. He related Clemenceau's unsuccessful plan at the end of the war, to have the Rhine made the western boundary of Germany; the attempt to get the United States and England to guarantee French security; and how, failing in both of these efforts, France was left in a state of fear, which caused her, by means of treaties and alliances, to gradually encircle Germany with a band of steel.

Pointing out other positions of unrest in Europe today, he mentioned the Little Entente fear of German aggression in the Balkans; the scare caused by Hitler's threat to take Ukraine; and Mussolini's desperate warning against British intervention in the Italian conquest of Ethiopia.

Finally, Dean Mitchell discussed the possibility of future peace in Europe. He described briefly the plan of collective security proposed by the British Foreign Secretary, Sir Anthony Eden, and also the suggestion of Hoare to share raw

materials.

In conclusion, he stated that while there was some hope for successful arrangement of the sort, the great prevalence of fear and mistrust on the continent would preclude any immediate action in that direction.

Thetas Are Entertained By Miss Bale Saturday
