## Varsity Smothers Central Thinclads

### Team Tops 100 Point Mark and Swamps Bearcats

The Alma thinclads smothered Central State Teachers 105½ to 24½ in the Campus Day track meet held on Davis Field Wednesday. The Scot speedsters took twelve first places and nine seconds which completely overpowered the Teachers.

A very strong cold wind hindered the Scots from making good times in the events but they were never pushed to extend themselves at any time. Ralph Schiefley led the Scots by taking first places in the 100,220, high hurdles and the low hurdles, totaling 20 points. Dean followed by taking two first places, in the mile and 440 yard dash. The work of Gilbert, Fuller, Breneman and Block was outstanding. Ginrich was outstanding for the Teachers, taking a first place in the discus which was their only first place.

From the Zeta-Phi ball game, played in rain and hail, the Alma Central State track meet held under a clear blue sky and the Campus Night Dance given beneath the stars the 1936 edition of Campus Day was a complete success. The crowning of the twin Queens' of Scots in the gym, the record breaking (victory of the Sophs in the Tug-of-War, the interclass girls ball game and the outdoor luncheon served in the Grove all contributed to making the 26th annual affair the best in the history of Alma College.

With a royal fanfare the Queen of Scots, tiny Gretah and Gretchen Wilson, marched to the apple-blossomed throne erected in the gym and received their crowns from Professor Roy Hamilton. Following closely upon the long white train of their Queens were the Court in lovely Spring colors. Members of the court were Misses Wilma Wright, Charlotte Temple, Pauline Chick, Aletha Hapner, Opal Hines, Marjory Anderson, Betty Jane Swarouth and Heater Moon.

Acting in their official capacity, the Royal Twins presented seven seniors with awards signifying they had been elected the most outstanding member of the Senior Class. The honored students were Riley Block, Alma; Arthur Boynton, Grand Rapids; Luther Evans, Gaylord; Claude Knight, Boyne City; Mae Nelson, St. Louis; Jane Rice, Midland; and Bruce York, Belding.

Professor Hamilton presented the Queens with scarfs which were the gift of the Reverend Malcom of Three Rivers and the coronation ceremonies concluded with the singing of the Alma College Chant under the direction of Professor J. W. Ewer.

The noon luncheon was served in the Grove with the menu consisting of baked beans, potato salad, red hot, ice cream, cookies and coffee.

## Sophs Make History and Pull Frosh Through Pine River in Record Time

The tug-of-war ended in disaster for the Frosh last Wednesday in the shortest time ever recorded in the history of the annual classic, just eighty-nine seconds. After a short and hopeless struggle the Frosh leaped into the river led by their class president, George Purdy, and attacked the Sophs at close quarters, throwing most of them into the water before Coach Royal A. Campbell fired the gun ending the proceedings.

In spite of evident defeat in the pulling, the Frosh claimed a moral victory of a sort, since the only victors not ducked were Stan Cater, who was too far beneath a pile of struggling freshmen to be reached, and Ruth Gilbert, who was saved by the gun. Genial Henry Tanghe, embodying the beaten but unbowed "spirit of '39" was the first freshman to enter the water, followed by the whole class. Fred Meyers, president of the sophomore class, was the first man seized by the Frosh and ducked in the baptismal font of a decade of Alma College students.

In spite of results there are still two schools of thought concerning the respective merits of the two teams. One is the Soph school which maintains that the event couldn't have ended other-

wise, considering the relative strength and virility of the two teams, and the other is the Frosh school, which lays its poor showing to lack of organization, and maintains that any time a team with an anchor man like Angus MacGarvah loses, it's a mistake any way you look at it. Had any of the ruses employed by either side been successful the outcome might have been entirely different, but unfortunately the stakes driven into the ground by the sophomores were discovered and removed, while the freshmen were detected attempting to tie their end of the rope around a tree. George Reed, well known Pioneer Hall commentator, when asked to explain the freshman defeat, attributed the lack of success to a lack of sufficient co-ed support.

## Here Lies Tradition

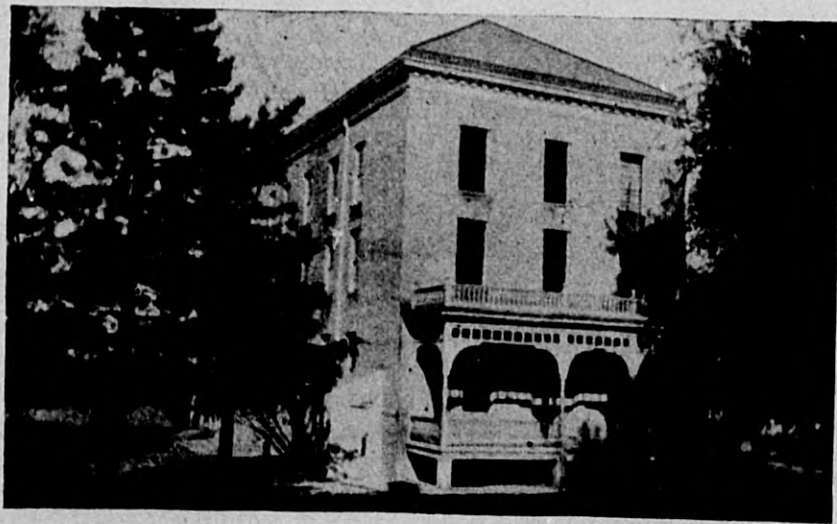
Traditions are a part of every college and university, and the passing of one causes a feeling of regret.

This year at Alma saw the passing or curtailment of several. Class fights have been frowned on and "Hell-Week" was but a mockery. True, a semblance remained but this only to make easier the final obliteration of the practices. Class distinction, according to a bulletin from the Student Council, was abolished three months ago. This came as a surprise because the bulletin was not published until Monday, May 11.

The stand of President Crooks and the faculty is quite clear on these questions. They are definitely opposed on the grounds of the danger attached and that they are practices now outmoded in first rate institutions. The residents of Alma are not opposed except in the few cases where destruction has been wrought. On the contrary the residents have derived much amusement from undergraduate activities, perhaps because they help them to remember a younger, more carefree age. The undergraduates are almost unanimous in their desire for the continuance of these traditions and are willing to risk even expulsion in their attempts to satisfy this desire.

In the light of cold reason class fights do have dangerous aspects, but in the same light, so do football, basketball, wrestling, boxing, and track which can cause more injuries and deaths annually than class-fights cause in a decade. That the practice still exists in prominent institutions is substantiated by stories and pictures from Brown, Duquesne, and Wayne Universities. These, of course, are but idle arguments as the ruling has been handed down; the undergraduates must accept the new order. That which was tradition must now become legend. Deprived of tradition let us keep the memory, bright, warm, and living, as were the institutions which gave rise to them.

### Hillsdales Will Also Compete in Last Meet Before Field Day

The first outdoor meet in which they have competed against each other this year will find Coach Campbell and the Alma track team in a triangular meet with Kalamazoo and Hillsdale on Up-John Field, Kalamazoo, this coming Saturday.

The meet will go a long way in determining how far Alma can be expected to go in the coming M. I. A. A. Field Day. The Scots will be at full strength and with Schiefley, Dean and Gilbert at their best Alma should come home with a fair share of the points.

One of Alma's best bets is Harold Dean who placed sixth in the half mile at the Michigan Intercollegiate meet held in Ann Arbor last Saturday. Dean ran the best race of his career making the distance in 2:02.

Another sure winner should be Ralph Schiefley as he ran wild against Central State taking firsts in the dashes and both hurdles. Atlee Gilbert who took both jumps in the Teachers meet without being forced to the limit will have stiffer competition but he is expected to come through with points.

Other possibilities for points are Cresswell in the two mile run, Riley Block and Art Smith in the pole vault, Mel Fuller in the weights and Brenneman in the runs.

The Frosh team defeated the upperclass women 11 to 7 in the annual interclass women's softball game on Campus Day. The game was a fast one with plenty of hits, among them two Frosh home runs by Hannig and Schaffsma, frequent errors and wild base running.

The upperclass women started the game off with Charlotte Temple and Dorothy Glass singling. Helen Jordan drove them in with a double and came in on Margaret Randels' single. Edith Walker drove Randels in. In the Frosh half Gladys Glass drove out a hard double and Lillian Hannig hit her in with a clean single, ending the inning. Score—upperclass 4; Frosh 1.

Betty Jane Swarthout, for the Frosh, made first and went too third on Schaffsma's single. Gladys Glass drove them both in with a double to center field. Temple led off in the third with another single. Jo Elliot safe on an error allowed Temple to score. Schaffsma, first up in the third for the Frosh, slapped out a long home run. Frevert doubled and Hannig singled. Score—uppers 7; Frosh 7.

In the fourth Walker singled, went to second as Anderson was thrown out at first. Tenney singled. Damon struck out and Pauline Dionese ended the inning by driving the first ball pitched to Gladys Glass. In the Frosh half, Swarthout, Schaffsma, Glass and Frevert all made first due to poor fielding. Then Hannig slapped out a home run to left field to provide the margin of victory. 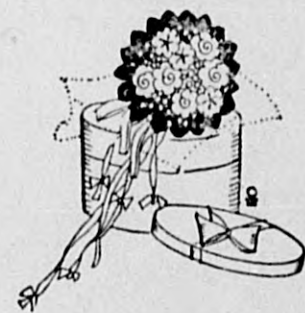
