Two or three petitions have been started the past week with the hope of extending the time allotted for the Christmas lated in the calendar, and the other for: a few days' extension after New Year's.

When the Faculty was making up the calendar, the short ness of the Christmas vacation this year was justified by the week earlier in June. Final exams are early next month be ginning on the 19th, and the second semester will get under way in January. It was thought, too, that students might as well return on New Year's Day because most fathers return to ork on Tuesday anyway, and couldn't make the trip then

In spite of these considerations, those students who
to work during the Christmas vacation are handicapped plan to work during the Christmas vacation are handicapped by the present plan. By the time they get home the jobs will be taken, or they will be able to work only a day or two at
the most, during the Christmas rush. However, it would seem that school events during the next week make a longer vacation before Christmas undesirable to a majority of the students.

On the other hand an extension of two days after New Year's Day is generally favored. The present plan forces most of us to forego New Year's Day at home, in order to be back for 7:50 classes on Tuesday. Those living at great distances must start back on Sunday. If the vacation could be extended until Thursday, no one would find it necessary to start back before Tuesday, and most students would get two weeks at home. Many students living in or near larger cities for term papers, an advantage that is hampered under the present plan. The local high school has considered the transportation problem of its teachers and is not reopening until Wednesday. It does not appear unreasonable to ask the Faculty, when it meets today, to reconsider the situation, and take into account the student viewpoint.
