## COLLEGE WINS TWO, LOSE ONE OVER WEEK END

### Ypsilanti a Bit Too Much for Scots So Soon After Two Hard Games.

One road trip and two home games gave the Scots two victories, both MIAA, and one loss, non-association game, over the past week end. Friday night, the Scots journeyed to Albion and came back home with the big end of a 40 to 29 score. The next night also ended in a victory against Kalamazoo, here, 33 to 28 in a harder battle. The Hurons came up from Ypsilanti Monday and the Scots were taken for a ride 37 to 31 in a good battle.

The Scots took an early lead in the Albion struggle and were

never headed. The Alma forwards exhibited scoring powers beyond the reach of the purple. Borton again led in scoring honors for Alma with 12 points. However, he was passed by Smith of Albion who sank six baskets and one foul for 13 points. However, the rest of the Daugherty men could not keep up the pace, so the Scots had a fairly easy time of it.

Albion's defense was weakened with the loss of Krapp, veteran center, and this was further shown by Volk's scoring spree of 11 points. The Alma defense lived up to its name and was tight throughout the game, except when Smith slipped in for a couple of close ones. About three-fourths of Albion's baskets were made from away out on the floor, so that also speaks very nicely of the Scots defensive playing.

Abie Kahn played only about four minutes in the last half, due to his weakened condition caused by his recent tilt with the flu. Abe is recovering slowly, so his playing time is limited for the present. However, Hunter's playing was gratifying and his four points helped in the scoring.

Albion had little to offer besides Smith as a scoring star. Carl Riskey and Ruttman were the nearest with six points apiece, but the whole team lacked the punch when advantages were opened. Ruttman was excluded from the game in the last half with four personals and D. Fisher and Schuler did not fare much better.

#### Alma-Kalamazoo Game

Alma made it two straight over Kalamazoo in a rather slow game Friday night. The final score was 33-28.

Borton dropped in a short shot to start things off and then Volk followed with another one. Kalamazoo was slow in getting started and at half time the score stood at 20 to 12. Beginning the second half, the Hornets began to climb and with a series of long shots brought their score to within three points of Alma. Catherman was fouled and when he missed his shot, Borton tipped one in to pull Alma out of danger. The game ended without any further scoring.

Dawson was high point man with 13 points and Volk came next with 10. Warner led Kalamazoo's attack with 11 points and Niefert was second with 8 points. Kahn who still shows evidence of his recent sickness played only a few minutes. His place was taken by Hunter and Beech.

In the preliminary game, the Freshman "gazelles" easily beat Crosswell High School 23-14. The Frosh were slow in getting started but they easily pulled away in the second half. For the Gazelles, House scored seven points and Noble and Yale scored six apiece, while Keglowitz with eight points and Sepeny with six accounted for all of Crosswell's points.

#### Ypsi Game

Ypsi got off to an early start Monday night and only for one short while was Alma in the lead, so Ypsi triumphed, 37 to 31. The powerful Ypsi offense functioned when the Alma defense went lax, while outside of Borton Alma could do very little offensively.

Borton was clearly the individual star of the game with eight baskets and two free throws for a total of 18 points. Frank Wornziak led the Huron cagers with five baskets, four of which were earned in the first half. Had the rest of the team kept up with Borton, the Scots would have had very little trouble in defeating the Ypsi five.

Dawson and Catherman did not play their usual games, failing to score when the chances were offered.

On defense, Ypsi scored more than half its shots from within the fifteen foot mark. This was especially true of Wornziak's baskets in the first half. Benny Bayer dropped in a couple from quite a ways out. George Jagnaw was taken from the game by Coach Ockerman in favor of Waldo Ashley. Ashley was a regular last year and his eight points pulled Ypsi out of a couple of holes.

Ypsi took the lead as Wornziak dropped in two baskets and Bayer one, before Borton got the first of his. But Frankie came back with another. Howdie Catherman slipped down the floor for a bucket, his only points of the game. Eight points in succession then gave the Scots a 12 to 10 lead. Three baskets for Ypsi changed the lead and Borton finished the scoring for the Scots at the half.

After Dawson sank a foul shot to start the second half, the Hurons amassed eleven points before the Scots could get in to score. However, the Alma five came back with five baskets by Dawson, Borton and Volk to within four points of the leaders. Ypsi then just managed to keep off the Scots for the remainder of the game.

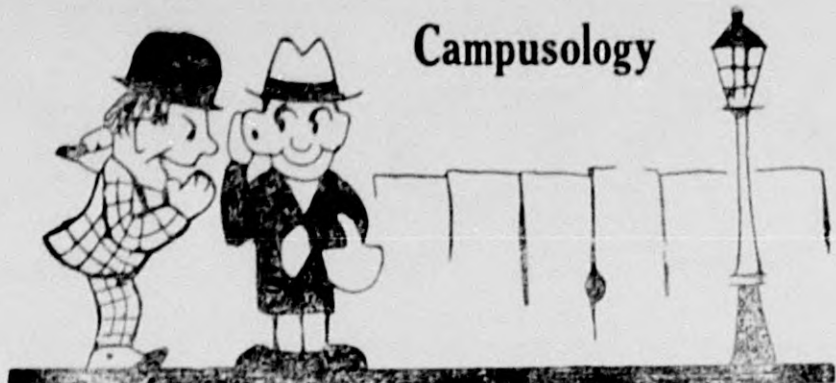
