One Of Alma's Graduates Who Has "Clicked," Is Elwyn Carter

Among Alma college's former students who have become famous in the musical world, is Elwyn Carter, young American bass-baritone, who hails from Detroit, Michigan. Carter began his musical career as a boy soprano, and during his early school days was in great demand for singing appearances. Upon reaching Alma college, from where he was graduated with a B.A. degree, he continued his musical studies and decided to make singing his career. He later attended the University of Michigan.

He came to New York, on the advice of several well known musicians to continue his studies at the Juilliard School of Music,

where he was awarded a fellowship. While at this latter school, he sang the leading bass roles in many opera productions, including "The Sleeping Beauty," by Beryl Rubinstein, and "The Abduction from the Seraglio," by Mozart.

During his short but most unusual career, this brilliant American singer has gained unusual recognition and acclaim from both critic and public wherever he has appeared.

At present Mr. Carter is soloist at the First Presbyterian church in New York City, which position he has held for a number of years.

DEBATERS FACE HARD SCHEDULE

State Tournament to Be Held at East Lansing Next Month.

The Alma college debate squad faces a tough schedule after classes are resumed in January. Coach Carney Smith has announced that teams will go to Albion college on the eighteenth of January to enter in a tournament there, and will attend the state tournament at Michigan State college later in the month. Arrangements have been made for debates with Michigan State college to be held before various groups and clubs throughout Michigan, and a series of debates will also be held with Western State Teacher's College.

The annual tournament held at Manchester, Indiana, will come a little later in the year, and another tournament will be held in Madison, Wisconsin.

The debate season is now well under way. The teams are meeting three times a week to have intra-squad debates, and it is hoped that they will be ready to make a good showing at all of the tournaments.

Six members of the squad traveled to Michigan State College last Tuesday to engage in round table discussions with students from other schools. The discussions were based on the current debate question, and the contestants were graded on their ability to promote and aid discussion.

Alma College was admitted to the MIAA conference in the spring of 1902.

\$60,000 RAISED IN MONEY DRIVE

Solicitation in Detroit Starts Next Month for Col- lege Campaign.

President John W. Dunning of Alma college announced today that recent returns on Alma college's Five Year Finance campaign shows that over \$60,000.00 in cash and subscriptions have been received by the campaign offices located in the Wolverine hotel in Detroit. To date the campaign has covered a period of eight weeks with most of the soliciting done outside of Detroit. The drive in that city will begin soon after the new year.

The campaign is only in its early stages, according to Dr. Dunning, and it is hoped a sum of over \$100,000.00 will be raised this year. At present plans call for the erection of a new chapel and work begun on one of the new campus buildings before next fall.

The quota set by the campaign committee, which is headed by Col. Frank Knox, publisher of the Chicago Daily News and former Alma college student, is \$500,000 over a period of five years.

Campbell Sets Conference Record With His 15 Years At Alma College

Royal R. Campbell, the "Grand Old Man of the MIAA," established a conference record for services as a coach when he completed a 15-year period as director of athletics at Alma college, his Alma Mater, in June 1935. In those fifteen years, "Argyle" captured five football championships and tied for one.

In 1923 Alma won their first championship under Campbell, and again in 1926, and 1927. In 1929 the Scots again won the crown and tied for first place the following year with Kalamazoo. Then for five years, Alma hit the skins and didn't come up with a championship again until 1935, the year that Campbell retired. That year

HOLIDAY BEGINS NEXT SATURDAY

Scots Continue Basketball Schedule; Inter-Frat Dance on Jan. 6.

Alma college students will call a halt to their studies again next Saturday noon to begin their eighteen-day Christmas vacation. Classes will come to a close Saturday noon, December 16, and will commence again January 3 at 7:50 a. m.

During the holidays, Alma college's varsity basketball team will see plenty of action. On December 21, the Scots will go to Toledo, Ohio, where they will meet DeSalles University and the following night the Toledo University Junior varsity five. The Scots dropped their game to DeSalles last year and this marks the first meeting with Toledo U. Highland Park Junior college, December 23; Traverse City Independents, the old stamping ground of Coach Gordon Macdonald on December 27, are also listed on the Scots Christmas schedule.

Scotties Begin Season

The Scotties will begin their basketball season soon after the holidays against Bay City Junior College. Other home games for the frosh are Hope Frosh, January 27, and Central State Teachers freshman on February 2.

Alma college's Drama club will present their mid-winter production on the tentative date of January 8. The title of the play is "The Night of January 16th." Mr. Marvin Volpel, member of the faculty, is directing.

The first Alma college Inter-fraternity dance will be an event of January 6, three days after the return of the students. Delta Gamma Tau, Zeta Sigma, and Phi Phi Alpha fraternities have joined in the sponsorship of the dance which will be a semi-formal affair. Art Howland's popular dance band from East Lansing will play. This band has been featured over radio station WKAR, East Lansing, and played at the Alma Homecoming dance.

Adrian-Lawrence Tech Fall Before Alma's Sophomores

STRONGEST ALMA TEAM IN 4 YEARS

Mac-Men Loom as Serious Title Threat. To Meet Central Tonight.

Displaying precision and balanced play, Alma college's cagers opened the current season last week with two overwhelming victories, one at home and one away.

The squad, which has been cut down to 11 players by Coach Gordon A. Macdonald for the remainder of the season, now has only one upperclassman.

Alma, 41; Adrian, 24.

After playing on almost equal terms as far as the scoring column was concerned, during the first half, the Scots turned on the pressure against Adrian's Bulldogs in the last half Thursday night to swish their way to a 41-24 victory in Memorial gymnasium.

Coach Macdonald used the entire squad to good advantage, and scoring was distributed rather equally. High point men were Captain Jack Howe and Keith Carey who tallied 10 each. After missing six shots in the first quarter, Bud Howe came back in the third to cage four out of seven attempts.

Looking especially good for all-around play and ball hawking was Warren Hartt, who looked good as a starter in both games.

Play was extremely fast throughout the game, with the pace causing faulty ball handling in some parts of the game. The Scots were up on foul shots, caging nine out of 13 tries.

Alma, 47; Lawrence Tech, 27

After a half-time score of 22 to 18, the Scots, with Bob Kirby behind the gun, downed the Blue Devils of Lawrence Tech with a barrage of baskets last Friday night to win, 47 to 27, in one of the fastest and roughest games this writer has ever witnessed.

The game was in dedication of Farmington's new gymnasium and Alma, as the home team, received the backing of an overflowing crowd.

Tinker came through with six baskets and two foul tosses for a total of 14 points, to lead the scoring as the Scots played great ball, both offensively and defensively. In the last half, the excellent defense of the Alma cagers held the so-called Blue Devils to a lone field goal and seven foul tosses.

Captain Howe and Chick Gallagher looked outstanding for their ball-hawking which kept Alma in control of the ball most of the time.

Play on both sides was extremely rough, with Alma collecting 16 personals and Lawrence Tech being called on 20 personals and one technical. The Scots, however, did not take advantage of this, sinking only 15 out of 28 free tosses.

SCOTTIES NEED MORE HEIGHT

Syl Fortino Is Only Member of Freshman Squad Who Approaches Six Feet.

The greatest drawback to a successful season for the Alma college Frosh basketball team will probably be height. Only one man, Syl Fortino, even approaches the six foot level.

Coach Howe announced this morning that the squad would probably be cut down to twelve men. This would facilitate getting the boys into shape, as it has been impossible to take care of more men in the few hours the team is assigned the gym.

Max Tullis and Jack Howe look good at the forward posts but both of these boys lack height. They are both good ball handlers, however, and they have plenty of speed.

Don Heimforth is battling it out with Fortino for the center job, but his height may result in his being used at a forward position some of the time. Maurice Johnson is a good floor man and should see considerable action. Again, though, the lack of height is a severe handicap.

Gerald Lavender, Wally Moore, Jack Tait, Jack Crandall and Richard Beach are all possible selections for the guard berths. All of these fellows will probably see lots of action before the season is over. Beach has the height, but he is rather slow and inexperienced. Lavender shows promise at the guard post, as does Neil Levy at a forward post. Moore, a clever ball handler, may be shifted to a

ED ZEIM NAMED SCOTS CAPTAIN

Announcement of His Selection Made at Annual Football Banquet by D. Smith.

Ed Zeim, junior tackle from Pontiac, was announced captain of the 1940 Alma college football team Tuesday night at the annual football banquet. The announcement was made by Don Smith, retiring captain.

Zeim, a 175-pound husky, was named on the second team on the all-MIAA selections this fall. He was one of the iron men on the squad, playing nearly every minute of every game.

Zeim is the brother of Fred Zeim, who played guard on University of Michigan's varsity football team in 1935-36.

The banquet was a very informal affair with only short talks by President John W. Dunning and Professor James Mitchell. Art Smith, freshman football coach, read the names of those receiving numerals and Coach Gordon Macdonald read the names of the varsity letter winners. Announcements of these awards were made shortly after the close of the football season.

SCOTS ON ROAD DURING VACATION

Before the next issue of The Almanian, Alma's Scots will face seven more basketball games, four of which will be played during Christmas vacation, and all of which will be away.

Tonight the boys will go to Mt. Pleasant to take on Alma's traditional rival, Central state, in a game certain to be a thriller all the way, promising plenty of good basketball.

Also this week, the Scots will take on Ferris Institute, meeting that five on Friday night at Big Rapids.

Before Christmas, three games are scheduled. On Dec. 21, the Scots will meet DeSalles business school at Toledo. The next day,

they will, for the first time in the history of the school, play St. Mary's at the University of Toledo. The following night, Dec. 23, they will meet Highland Park junior college at Detroit. All three of these games promise to be a real challenge to the Scots.

On the 27th, the boys will travel to Coach Macdonald's old coaching grounds, Traverse City, for a game which appears to be the center of big celebration there. The entire city is aiding in advance preparations for the game, which includes much publicity in that section, in order to make the game a part of the holiday activities.

Two days after school re-opens, on Jan. 5, the boys will take on the Hornets of Kalamazoo College in Tredway gymnasium in the Paper City. Coach Chet Barnard has lost most of last year's great team, but has Dan Wood and Dick Lemmer returning along with other likely recruits. The Hornets, as is their usual custom, have a good defensive ball club with much height. Before the game with the Scots they will have played several games sure to test their strength and give them experience, including such stellar opponents as Albion, Hillsdale, and Hope.
