Coach Howe announced this morning that the squad would probably be cut down to twelve men. This would facilitate getting the boys into shape, as it has been impossible to take care of more men in the few hours the team is essigned the gym.

Max Tullis and Jack Howe look good at the forward posts both of these boys lack height. They are both good ball handlers. however, and they have plenty of

speed. Don Heimforth is battling it out with Fortino for the center job. but his height may result in his being used at a forward position some of the time. Maurice Johnson is a good floor man and should see considerable sction. Again, though, the lack of height is a severe handicap,
