Sebo Men In Spring Grid Session

Spring football practice started last Tuesday and 32 men answered Coach Steve Sebo's call for the opening session, which consisted mostly of blocking drills. Scrimmages will begin this week.

Coach Sebo announced that practice sessions would be held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

The 1947 football team will operate from the T-formation, Sebo said. Under this offensive system plays can be run directly from the T or from a shift into a single wing.
