NAVY SCRATCH PAD

Using seaplanes, small crash boats and other surface craft, the Army-Navy rescue service has saved more than 80 percent of the fliers shot down in waters near Rabaul. . . Charles Harmon, former University of Toledo basketball star, is setting the pace for the Great Lakes Naval Training Station's Negro varsity basketball team with 162 points in 15 games to date. . . A shipyard in Portland, Ore., engaged in all-out production of Navy lighters, is naming the ships for employees holding plant records. Comdr. Eddie Peabody, known on every stage as the "Banjo King," and six members of his band and entertainment division at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, will leave soon for an entertainment tour of Pacific bases. The group will visit points on the fighting front not included in the itinerary of USO and other camp show entertainment groups. . . A new stainless steel cargo plane will be put into production for the Army and Navy. Six hundred of the planes will go to the Navy and 200 to the Army. . . The number of WAVES supply officers now exceeds the pre-war strength of the Navy Supply Corps. . . In addition to his regular duties, Navy Pharmacist's Mate John Leonard, has delivered seven Samoan babies to native wives. . . Before he hit the Pacific, Leonard's experience along this line came only out of books.

WOMEN IN DENTISTRY

ACP Feature Service
Detroit, Mich.—(ACP) Women dentists, as scarce now as women welders were before Pearl Harbor, will appear in the future in ever-increasing numbers, Professor Charles W. Creaser, chairman of the pre-medical and pre-dental committee at Wayne university, predicts.

Professor Creaser points out that of more than 1,400 dentists now practicing in Detroit, only 12 are women, and that throughout the country there are 35 men in the profession for every woman. "The skill which women in war industries are displaying in the manipulation of small tools," said Professor Creaser, "gives ample evidence of their aptitude for at least one phase of dental work. Furthermore, we know that the few women who have entered the profession have proved exceptionally successful, particularly in the fields of children's dentistry and orthodontia."

Dr. Creaser also emphasized the existing need for Negro dentists, both male and female, and quoted Dr. M. Don Clawson, director of dental education at Meharry medical college, Fisk university, as saying that there are only 2,000 Negro dentists, very few of them women, serving the 12,000,000 Negroes in the United States.
