Debaters Travel to Lansing

On Saturday, November 2, the debate class journeyed by bus to Lansing to hear the state debate tournament for Michigan high schools. These debates were held at Eastern High School.

At 9:30 A.M. before the high school debates began, everyone enjoyed a demonstration debate between the University of Michigan and Northwestern University. The team from Michigan took the affirmative side on the question of socialized medicine. These debaters used a cross-question type of debate known as the Michigan-Oregon style.

At the conclusion of the demonstration debates, several of the members of Alma's debate class were requested to judge high school debates on the same question as had been used in the demonstration debate. There were three rounds of high school debates which were judged by Alma students.

Veterans Fail to Change Addresses

Failure of Michigan veterans to notify the VA of changes of address has resulted in hundreds of subsistence checks being returned to the Treasury Department, it was revealed today by the Detroit Regional Office of the Veterans Administration.

Thirty-four hundred checks were returned last week alone and, with more than 50,000 ex-servicemen and women enrolled in schools throughout the State under the GI Bill, the figure was expected to mount. Postal laws forbid forwarding of Government checks, it was explained.

Guy F. Palmer, Manager of the local VA office, took immediate steps to correct what he termed "a critical situation." Palmer directed that letters be sent to every veteran drawing subsistence checks for training under the GI Bill warning the veteran to be sure that the VA has his correct address.

"Failure to notify the VA immediately of your change of address will result in a delay of the issuance of your subsistence check," Palmer's letter warned. "It is, therefore, of the utmost importance that the following procedures are immediately carried out in the event that you change your address.

Notify the VA immediately by contacting your VA training officer or notify the contact officer who services the community in which you at present reside; or to the Finance Officer, Veterans Administration, Guardian Bldg., write 500 Griswold St., Detroit 26, Michigan. Post card will suffice.

It is your responsibility to give the VA representative complete information relative to your request for change of address including:

(1) Old address; (2) New address; (3) Claim number; and (4) Personal signature."

Jim Thorpe, Noted Indian Athlete Speaks at Alma College Tomorrow

Jim Thorpe, the world's greatest natural athlete, will speak in the Alma College chapel at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Here is the chance for all devotees of athletics at Alma College to see and hear the greatest all-round athlete of all time. The exploits of the famous Indian are still related today and will continue to be related for a long time to come.

Thorpe, at 58 years of age, can still come out the champ in every field of sport. Not long ago he took a football and drop-kicked it over the goal posts from midfield in one direction, then turned around and kicked another goal in the opposite direction. In Hollywood, while back he did the standing broad jump at 10 feet eight inches, just six inches short of the world's record.

Thorpe's muscles react perfectly to this day and he is tops in baseball, golf, bowling, football, basketball, tennis, hockey, broad jumping, discus throwing, boxing and any other sport you wish to name. Walter Camp twice picked him on his all-American football team and recently 800 sports experts placed him on the all-time all-American team.

James Francis Thorpe was born at Prague, Oklahoma, in 1888. His father was half Irish and half Indian and his mother was one quarter French and three quarters Indian. Through his mother, Jim was a descendant of Chief Black Hawk, the famous warrior of the Sauk tribe.

At the age of three he could ride like the wind and when he was 13 he could break wild horses with the best of them. At that time he was known as Chief Bright Path but when at 15 he went to Carlisle Institute in Pennsylvania he became just plain Jim.

Pop Warner tells how Jim's colorful career began. One day while Jim was cleaning the athletic grounds he noticed the high jump bar at five feet eight inches, where the last jumper had left it in despair.

"That bar don't look so high," Jim remarked.

"Can you jump it?" asked another student.

Jim replied in the affirmative, then promptly and easily jumped over the bar, clearing it by four inches. From then on he was a member of the Carlisle track team.

In his first track meet, against Lafayette, he won five events. Later, against both Harvard and Penn State, he captured eight first places.

Jim was not a large man. He stood five feet 11 1/2 inches and weighed 180 pounds. He was a lazy, easy-going fellow who never trained or practiced, but he always won.

In 1912 Jim won both the pentathlon and decathlon at the Olympics in Stockholm. No other athlete in history had ever won both of these events. The king of Sweden presented Thorpe with a bronze bust and said, "You, sir, are the greatest athlete in the world."

When Jim returned to America he joined the Carlisle Indians football team. When Carlisle beat West Point, 27 to 6, Thorpe was responsible for every point. His greatest personal triumph came in 1911 against Harvard when he kicked four field goals, the winning boot splitting the Harvard goal posts from 52 yards out in the last two minutes of play. These are only a few of the many highlights in Thorpe's marvelous career.

Thorpe is touring the United States under the auspices of the School Assembly Service and he has such a full schedule that Alma College is indeed fortunate in having him appear here. Jim is not noted as an orator but he is a sincere, fine man. Every student in Alma College should welcome this opportunity to meet "the world's greatest athlete."

The chapel program yesterday evening was conducted by Dr. Joseph T. Roth, Dean of Religion. This was one of the regular weekly religious chapel programs.

SCOTS LOSE TO HILLSDALE 19-0

Chips Outswim Scots, 27-28

Although paced by the first place of Steve Nisbet, team captain, the Cross Country Cindermen of Alma College were unable to register enough points for a win over the Chippewas of Central Michigan College last Friday afternoon.

In a meet held at the Mount Pleasant course, the Scots fell just short of a victory, finally losing out by a score of 28-27.

This was the first cross-country meet for the Scots, and served as a warm-up for a return meet with Central this Friday, and for the MIAA meet scheduled for November 16th at Albion. After the MIAA meet, the Scots will journey to Lansing for the Nationals, to be held November 23rd.

Steve Nisbet, Scots Captain, turned in a winning time of 24:29.5, with second place going to Jim Little of Central with a time of 25:11. Other places in the first ten were Frazer (C) 25:18, Sneltenberger (A) 25:43, Taylor (C) 26:27, Dykema (A) 26:34, Morningstar (A) 26:34, Knox (C) 26:43, Eddy (C) 26:58, and Grover (A) 27:04.

A total of twenty-one men participated in the run which was for a distance of four miles, through wet and difficult terrain. A cold driving rain helped to slow the runners. Twelve men represented Central Michigan, with nine men running for Alma.

Besides the above listed, the following men from Alma completed the run. Anderson, 27:45; Watson, 28:03; Smith, 28:42; and Emery, 30:06.

Central took the last place in the race with a time of 31:07 turned in by Mason.

DALES PILE UP 219 YARDS RUSHING

November made a miserable entrance insofar as we, here at Alma, are concerned. Friday evening, November 1, our Scots sustained their third loss of the season, this time at the hands of a powerful Hillsdale eleven, 19-0.

To make matters worse, there was a steady drizzle which prevailed throughout the game to the displeasure of everyone. About the only bright spot of the evening was the fine turnout for the game. A crowd of about 2,000 braved the sleet, slush, and rain to support their home team.

The first half was much more one-sided than the score indicates, with Hillsdale racking up 11 of their 15 first downs to Alma's 2. Perhaps the main factor in holding down the score should be attributed to the line-backer-ups, although Gayle Saxton and Ken Rhynard played stalwartly in their line positions.

The scoring began in the opening minutes of the game when, after an exchange of punts, Hillsdale took over on the Alma 40-yard line. With Ward, Albright, and Young alternating, the Dales advanced the ball to the 11 in seven plays. Young took it over from there. Spiteri's kick was no good.

Soon afterwards, another exchange of punts gave Hillsdale the ball on their own 47 and, once again, they began to roll. Six plays brought the ball down to the Alma 27 as the first quarter ended. Albright, Young and Ward continued to alternate in carrying the ball, and six plays after the second quarter began saw Ward going over from the 2. Spiteri's kick was good and the score stood at 13-0. That's the way the score remained as the half ended, with Hillsdale monopolizing the ball the entire half. No, you can't win ball games, or even score points, for that matter, if the other team has the ball.

The second half opened with Teixeira of Alma getting away a beautiful kick down to the Hillsdale 5 where Albright of Hillsdale caught it and began moving down the center of the field. For a moment, it looked as though he were away for a TD when, on his 45, he had a clear field ahead of him, but he was brought down from behind by two unidentified Alma players at the 50.

A 15-yard penalty for clipping against Hillsdale stopped what appeared to be another touchdown drive on the Alma 30. The remainder of the third quarter saw the ball back and forth inside the Alma 50. Tullis punted from his own 21 to the 47, where Young brought the ball back to the Alma 28 before being stopped as the third quarter ended.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Young picked up 8 yards and, on the next play, Albright picked up 5 more to move the ball up to the Alma 15 for another first down. It was Ward's turn to take the ball so he took it, went off his own right tackle, reversed his field and went the distance for the third and last score of the game. On the try for extra point the pass from center was fumbled and the score stood Hillsdale 19, Alma 0.

When Hillsdale sent in their second stringers Alma made its only bid of the evening. The Dales kicked off to the Alma 20 where Temple of Alma took the ball and advanced it to the 43. A 15-yard penalty against the Dales gave the Scots the ball on the Hillsdale 42. After losing a yard and then picking up 4, the Scots were penalized 15 yards to their own 46. Butler tried a pass to Hanna which was complete for 12 yards. The same play worked again and the Scots had the ball on the Dales' 25 with a first and 10. Butler picked up 12 yards for another first and carried it two more times in succession to bring the ball

down to the 7-yard line. Here, a pass to Teixeira, was incomplete. Butler then tried an end around, but ole Tex was just too slow and by the time he got where he was supposed to be, the Dales' line had crashed through and hit Temple from behind, causing him to fumble.

The game ended a few minutes later.

Kazoo Contest Fri. Vital to Scots

There's no end of misery for the Alma College football team. After being pushed around for 60 minutes by a strong Hillsdale eleven Friday night, the Scots heaved a big sigh of relief, grateful for the end of the slaughter. But the breathing spell was short-lived for they suddenly realized that mighty Kalamazoo College is their next opponent.

Kalamazoo will have a definite incentive for beating Alma when the two schools meet under the arcs at Angell Field in Kalamazoo this Friday. By winning, the Hornets can automatically insure themselves of an M.I.A.A. co-championship, regardless of who wins the giant-killing Hope-Hillsdale game to be played at the latter's stadium Saturday afternoon.

Kalamazoo's M.I.A.A. record is three wins and one defeat. The Hornets, coached by Bob Nulf, proved their strength when they toppled the Hope Dutchmen, 13 to 0, to throw the M.I.A.A. race into a state of confusion. Their other conference victims are Adrian, 20-0, and Albion, 24-0. Their only league setback was a 20 to 0

trouncing by Hillsdale. Friday they dropped a 12 to 0 decision to Kent State in a non-conference tiff.

Hillsdale's 19-0 victory over Alma ended any title aspirations the Scots might have had. The Scots, decided underdogs in Friday's clash, would like nothing better than to upset Kazoo's applecart. The odds are great but anything happens in football.

If Alma surprises Kazoo, the winner of the all-important Hope-Hillsdale contest will be the league champion. If Hope and Hillsdale tie while the Hornets are losing, the Hollanders and Dales will share the crown. If Hope and Hillsdale tie while the Hornets are winning, Kalamazoo will capture the title. If both games end in deadlocks, a three-way tie for the championship will result.

Meet the Faculty . . .

Harland Richardson McCall is well pleased with Alma College, and has an active role in the advancement of our school in educational circles.

Prof. McCall is at home in Gratiot County, having been born in Ithaca, September 17, 1906. His father founded the Gratiot County Herald, whose present circulation is over 6,000. Two of his brothers still operate the paper.

His interest in education dates back to his childhood, as he frequently demonstrated the manly art of self-defense to his six brothers. His deep understanding, in part, may be attributed to association with his four sisters.

Between semesters at Ithaca high school, Prof. McCall could be found working on the paper, and at Albion, where he received his A. B. in Education, he managed the 1928 Championship Baseball team. Holding the key to the Sigma Nu Fraternity and editing their publication kept him well occupied.

After graduation he was with the Charlotte school system for 18 years; from teacher to superintendent. He published the Eaton County District, Michigan Educational Association Bulletin. Marie Diehl and he were married in Charlotte where she was teaching in the Elementary System.

Seeking further knowledge in Education and Journalism, he attended Northwestern University. Later he received his masters degree in School Administration at the University of Michigan. Here he studied Psychology under Dr. Howard McCluskey.

The housing shortage in Alma constitutes quite a problem for the McCalls. Mrs. McCall lives in Charlotte with the two children, Constance "Lou" and Mary "Lea", eleven and eight years old respectively. Prof. McCall drives from Ithaca each day. He says any change would be toward the good. (i.e. Apartment or small house in Alma.)

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Veterans Must Comply with Rules

Veterans who are attending educational institutions under provisions of the G. I. Bill must comply with the regularly prescribed standards and practices of the institutions during their period of enrollment, officials at Ohio-Michigan-Kentucky Branch Office of the Veterans Administration emphasized today.

Government-paid tuition to an educational institution does not place a veteran in a "special privilege" status, nor does it constitute a ticket on the so-called "gravy train", VA officials said. The government pays up to \$500 a year in tuition to enable a veteran to continue his education. In addition, a veteran receives subsistence allowance of \$65 monthly without dependents or \$90 with dependents.

Student veterans must abide by all the rules and regulations of the institutions where they are enrolled. They must maintain satisfactory academic marks. Willful misconduct or unsatisfactory progress are grounds for withdrawal of subsistence and tuition payments.

In the past, cases of willful misconduct or unsatisfactory progress have been negligible, VA said, and for the most part student veterans have attained academic marks equal to or above the non-veteran students.

Veterans cannot change courses of instruction without prior approval of VA. Student veterans who may encounter difficulty in academic work should avail themselves of the advisement and guidance service provided by VA.
