In 1912 Jim won both the pentathlon and decathlon at the Olympics in Stockholm. No other ath-
lete in history had ever won both of these events. The king of Sweden
presented Thorpe with a bronze bust and said, "You. sir, are the
greatest athlete in the world. When Jim returned to America he joined the Carlisle Indians foot-
ball team. When Carlisle beat West Point, 27 to Carlisle beat
6, Thorpe was esponsible for every point. His
greatest personal triumph came in 1911 against Harvard when he
kicked four field goals, the winkicked four field goals, the win-
ning boot splitting the Harvard goal posts from 52 yards out in the

without dependents or $\$ 90$ with dependents.
Student veterans must abide by institutions and regulations of the ed. They must maintain satisfac-
tory academic marks. Willful conduct or unsatisfactory pro-
gress are grounds for withdrawal of subsistence and tuition payments.
In the past, cases of willful mis-
conduct or unsatisf gress have been negligible, vasaid, and for the most part student veterans have attained academic marks equal to or above the non-veteran students. of instruction without prior proval of VA. Student veterans who may encounter difficulty in academic work should avail themselves of the advisement and guid
ance service provided by
