Student Council Revises Constitution

Graham Resigns from Presidency

Nan Harden to Fill Vacancy

Secretary MARION SPALSBURY of the Student Council of Alma College announces the resignation of President GUILLE GRAHAM, effective January 8, 1948. Mr. GRAHAM is to graduate in February and at that time will take up his duties as an employee of Alma College in the capacity of Director of Admissions and Alumni Relations.

NANCY HARDEN, former vice president of the Council, has stepped to the President's chair, and will guide the destinies of the top governmental body during the remainder of the year.

Mr. Graham's letter of resignation follows:

To The Members of the Student Council

In view of the fact that I am now associated with the administration of Alma College and that this body is a Student Council, it probably would be best for all concerned if I resigned from the post of President.

I want you to know that the only thing that motivates me to do this is that I believe it will be best for Alma College. I have enjoyed the privilege of being President of this group and I know that our Vice President, Nan Harden, is a very capable person.

It is very possible that I will not be a regularly enrolled student next semester, and if such is the case I will no longer remain President of the Senior Class, and they will send a new representative to this body.

I have had nothing other than pleasant associations with the students of Alma College.

The above resignation as President of the Student Council I wish to be effective as of January 9, 1948.

Snack Bar Opens in Student Union

Alma College students returning from the Christmas holiday found the new snack bar in the Student Union, formerly called the Chapel Recreation Room, open for business. The soda bar is in operation, and the hamburger grill will be in running order in a few days.

HOMER L. CURRY, Darlington, Wis., who arrived several weeks ago to supervise the installation of the snack bar, will manage the Student Union for the College. The plans are to install a French fryer and other equipment soon.

The soda bar and other equipment are of stainless steel, and the luncheon counter is completely covered with beige linen fermita to facilitate cleaning and resist wear.

New furnishings in the Union include: 4 davenport, 20 occasional chairs, 10 card tables, 40 matching chairs, 12 floor lamps, and 2 ping pong tables.

Student helpers will work part-time in the snack bar and full time workers will be hired.

The present plans call for the Union to be open all day Monday through Saturday, from 8 to 10 on week nights, and on Sunday beginning at 2 in the afternoon.

MR. CURRY plans later to extend activities of the Student Union to include various entertainments for the students. He extends a welcome to the town people of Alma to visit the snack bar and enjoy the new facilities.

The entire project has been carried out with the co-operation of President DALE D. WELCH, Business Manager EARL PETERSON, and many others.

Adoption Awaits OK By Co-op. Council

A new Constitution, drawn by the Student Council and passed by a majority vote of that body at a special meeting on Jan. 8, 1948, will be submitted to the Co-operative Council for its approval at the next meeting.

According to GUILLE GRAHAM, ex-council president, "the increased student interest in the student government of Alma College makes it only fitting and proper that the Student Council should, at this time, revise its Constitution so that its present position will be clear."

"It seems to me," Graham asserted today, "that this new Constitution gives a clear-cut picture of the powers and duties of your government. The key-note of any governmental body is, however, not the body itself but the people it represents. Your interest your help, and your devotion are

the things that will make your student government strong."

GRAHAM was the council officer most instrumental in drafting and in recommending the revised paper to the Student Council. A copy of the old constitution, printed in a 1936 edition of the ALMANIAN, was used as a model.

Members of the Student Council state that the new Constitution embodies many Articles of vital interest to every student interested in efficient, fair, representative government. They acknowledge that, outside of their own interest in furthering and supporting the desires of the student body, impetus was given to the revision by the request of the Co-operative Council that they submit a constitution for approval. It is the result of the efforts, recommendations, and aid furnished by the student investigating committee, NANCY HARDEN, new Council President, urges that all students read the complete draft of the Constitution printed elsewhere in this issue of the ALMANIAN.

Spiritual Emphasis Week Planned

The leader will be the Reverend David I. Berger, M. A. Th. D. Professor of Religious Education and Bible, University of Dubuque, Dubuque, Iowa.

The highlight of the religious life of the college year, Spiritual Emphasis Week will feature chapel talks and individual group conferences conducted by Dr. Berger.

In charge of the program is the faculty-student Religious Life Committee, headed by Dr. JOSIAH V. ROTH, Dean of Religion.

of the

Student Council of Alma College

Adopted at a special meeting
Jan. 8, 1948

CONSTITUTION FOR THE ALMA COLLEGE STUDENT COUNCIL

Adopted January 8, 1948

PREAMBLE

In order to provide an effective means of communication between the student body and the college authorities; to interpret and maintain college tradition and customs; to exercise a general supervision over student activities, organizations, traditions, customs, conduct, and to crystallize and make more effective the most worthy of student opinion, the following constitution is hereby established for the Alma College Student Council.

ARTICLE I Name

This organization shall be known as the "Student Council of Alma College."

ARTICLE II Membership

Section 1. The two upper class presidents shall be ex-officio members of the Student Council. In addition there shall be three members from the Senior Class, two from the Junior Class, two from the Sophomore Class, and one from the Freshman Class.

Section 2. If under the conditions as set forth in Section 1 of this article each sorority and fraternity does not have a representative, that fraternity or sorority without representation may send one of their members to the Council. This person shall have equal membership along with the other representatives.

Section 3. There shall also be one faculty member on the Council with full powers of any active member, except the privilege of voting. He shall be elected by the Faculty Body.

ARTICLE III Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Student Council shall be: President, Vice-president, Secretary, Treasurer and Social Chairman.

Section 2. The term of office for all officers shall be one year.

A special meeting of the Student Council was called on Thursday, January 8, 1948, to consider the adoption of a revised Constitution.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 P.M. Roll taken. Members present: President Gule Graham, Sec'y Marion Spalsberry, Treasurer VanDuzen, Wade Palmer, Richard Scheanwald, Clare Albee, Esther Johnson, Glen Rodgers, Rex Wood, and Donna Jensen. Pres. Graham completed the reading of the Constitution. Discussion by Member Scheanwald objected to Sec. 4 regarding petitions. Member Albee suggested that signatures by the student body would be more satisfactory. Further discussion followed. Member Albee made a motion that his suggestion be carried to a vote. Motion sustained by Member Scheanwald. Motion carried by unanimous vote. Sec. 4 to read, "Petition will be made by 25 per cent of the student body." Member Rodgers made comment about the treasurer making a monthly report to the council. Member Esther Johnson moved to vote on this matter. Motion seconded by Member Wood. Motion carried unanimously. Virginia Smith, appearing before the council as a representative of the student investigating committee, suggested that the minutes of each council meeting be published in the ALMANIAN. Motion to that effect made and seconded. Motion carried by unanimous vote. Member Albee objected to Sec. 1, Art. 2, regarding the election of members to the council. He contended that the Freshmen Class, the largest group on the campus, should be allowed more than one representative. Member Jensen suggested that seniority by class should not enter into the choosing of council members since the council represented the entire student body. Member Palmer countered that since students were segregated in all major student gatherings and events, it should be likewise on the council. Further discussion followed. At the vote, Members Graham, Spalsberry, VanDuzen, Palmer, Scheanwald, Johnson, and Rodgers voted against the motion. Supported by Jensen, Albee, and Wood. Rejected. Member Johnson moved to adopt the revised Constitution. Seconded by Member Palmer. Vote: Motion carried; Members Albee and Wood voted against the motion. Motion made by Member Scheanwald, to adopt the By-Laws and a majority vote carried the motion. Member Palmer voting against the motion. Pres. Graham's letter of resignation read by Sec'y Spalsberry. Resignation accepted. Meeting adjourned.

Mich. Normal Hands Alma Second Defeat

Fighting an uphill battle all the way, the Alma Scots fell before the Hurons of Michigan Normal last Saturday evening in a non-conference basketball tilt played at Ypsilanti. Overcoming a ten point deficit in the first quarter, and another ten point lead of the Ypsi quintet late in the final quarter, the locals fell just two points short of victory, losing out 48-46.

Desperate shooting typified the last few minutes as the Sebo men strived to tie the score or obtain a win. Russ Hester, rangy Scots center, left the game via the personal foul route, and was replaced by Rex Roseman. Rocky Walker, making his first appearance of the present season despite a bad leg, attempted a few long shots, but the inactivity of the past months told the story as the shots bounded off the rim.

Starting off fast, the Ypsi squad, fresh from a triumph over the University of Detroit, gained a 10-0 lead, but the Scots fought gallantly to tie the score at 11-11 ending the first quarter.

The second quarter saw scoring spurts by each team which put the half-time score at 22-21 with the locals favored.

Murray Hanna started the second half replacing Bill Saxton, but Bill was soon back in the game doing his bit for the Scots cause. A lay-up by Clark started the Scots off, followed by a corner shot by Budge. Chuck and Bill Saxton each contributed a field goal and free shot. Third quarter ended with the Alma cagers on the short end of a 37-21 score. Eight of the Ypsi points were made by Leo Turner, forward, while six were made by Len Sweet, guard.

Russ Hester, held scoreless the entire second half, left the game on fouls, as did Lloyd Keller,

Ypsi center, and Dick Gunther, Ypsi guard. These two had made only one bucket each during the second half, but were the big guns of the Hurons defense.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Ypsi squad had a lead of 47-37 over the Scots, but the two Saxtons and Budge made field goals, and Roy Clark racked up five points to bring the locals within three points of victory when the final whistle was sounded.

Roy Clark was high scoring man in the Alma lineup with 13 points, but was forced to yield game honors to Leo Turner of Ypsi who totaled 14. Len Sweet, also of Ypsi garnered 12.

The Scots were evidencing better form in this game, but lacked the scoring punch. Olivet forced Alma into a high scoring game last year when the two teams met at the Comets home gym. The locals were barely able to eke out a 72-67 victory, and the going was equally rough while the Olivet team visited here later in the season, although the Scots ended up with a ten point edge over the visitors.

Only two men are absent from the Comet lineup, and their shoes have been filled by men of equal capability. Joe Funk, 5'9" forward of Niles, Michigan, is back, he having been one of the Comets high scorers last year, totaling 247 points in 25 games. Dan Zordel, 6'2" center is also back, he having a 253 total for last year, and he is capable of doing the same this year. Lewis Jefferies, guard, with 220 points last year, is another of those returning to harass the opposition.

Albion has victories over the two cellar dwelling teams, Adrian and Hillsdale, and will come to Alma intent on bettering their record. Only member of the 1946-47 team not around is Elkin Issacs, while Lew Moon, 6'3" center still hogs the backboards, and the deadly eye of Lou Black continues to account for the Briton scoring. Albion was able to sneak across a 54-36 win over Adrian last Saturday night, Alma having a victory over Adrian by a 58-48 score.

Hillsdale and Adrian will be met on a road trip starting next Monday. Neither team has shown much this year, but Adrian is capable of an upset on their home court.

evening, Mike garnering 18 points, and Russ totaling 16. Harry Yeo, rival forward was Ferris high point man with a total of 10.

Ray Mohre, Joe Thibedeau, Murray Hanna, Rex Roseman, Mike Tobin, Bill Budge, and Bob Mohre saw action in reserve positions and each was evident of much promise for the future.

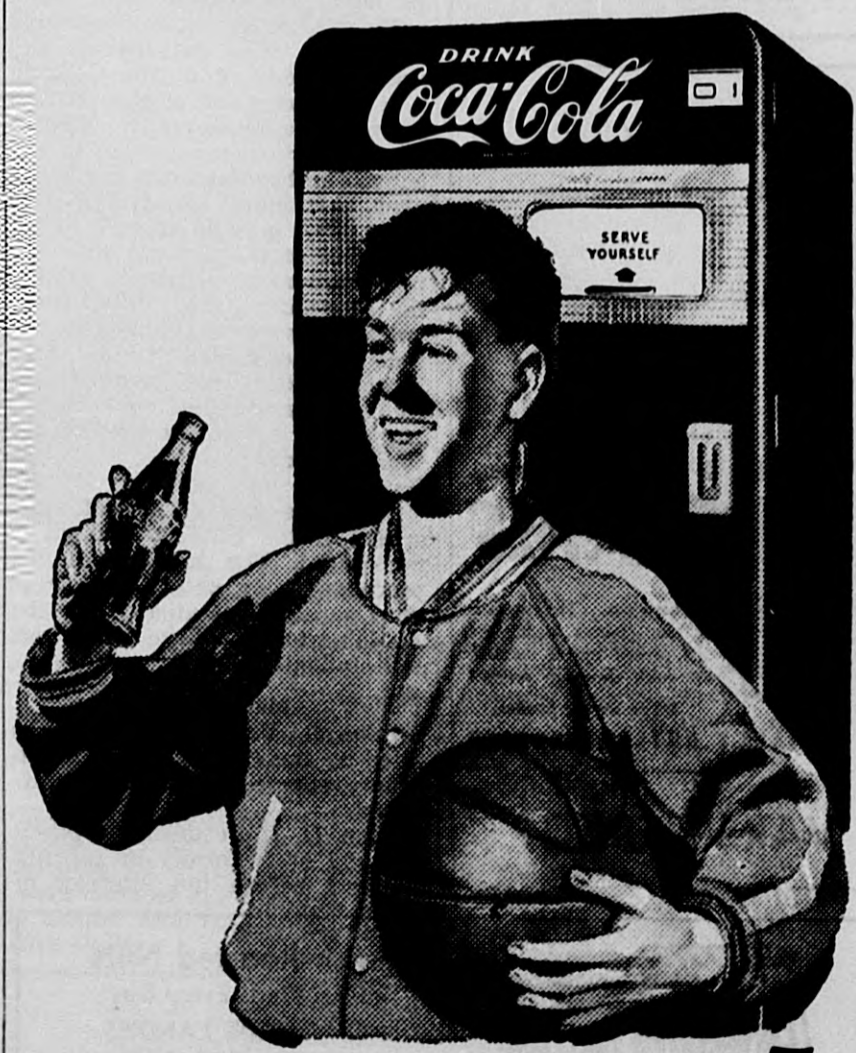

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The Constitution and By-Laws of the Student Council of Alma College

Continued from page one.

Section 3. The president of the Student Council shall be a senior. Section 4. After the class elections in May all newly elected Student Council members for the next year shall attend the next regular Student Council meeting. At this meeting they shall acquaint themselves with the workings of the Student Council and elect their officers for the following year. They shall also appoint the Student Marshall from the male members of the Senior or Junior Class. Section 5. All officers will assume their duties with the opening of the school year.

ARTICLE IV

Committees and Representatives Section 1. The Student Council shall send three representatives to the Cooperative Council. One of these representatives shall be the president of the Student Council. Only one of the other two representatives need be a member of

the Student Council. If one member is not a member of the Student Council, he shall have non-voting membership on the Council. At least one of these three representatives shall be a woman. These persons shall be selected at the first fall meeting of the Council.

Section 2. The Cooperative Council has committees on athletics, social life, religious life, music, speech and dramatics, publications, and assemblies and public occasions. See constitution of the Cooperative Council for explanation of each of these committees. The faculty body selects three of its members for each committee one of whom is designated chairman of the committee. The Student Council shall at its first meeting in the fall select three members of the student body for each of the seven committees, one of whom shall be designated as Vice-Chairman.

ARTICLE V

Meetings

Section 1. There shall be regular weekly meetings of the Council. The first meeting of the school year will be called by the president sometime during the first week of school. At that meeting a regular meeting time shall be decided on.

Section 2. Meetings of the council shall be public, however by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting the council may go into executive session.

ARTICLE VI

Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a three-fourths vote of the total membership of the Council, provided that notice has been given at the regular meeting preceding the meeting at which the amendment is to be voted upon.

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
