## Sebo's Eleven Gains MIAA League Crown

### Season Total of Eight Victories Sets Postwar Record for Alma

**MIAA CHAMPIONS:** Nine straight victories, undefeated this season in eight contests, unscored upon in the second half of any ballgame since the Hope fracas in 1947 — a record continuing through ten games.

#### Dutch Draw First Blood

The Scots didn't look too sharp in the first five minutes of play at Holland last Saturday afternoon, but like the champions they are, the boys overcame an early 13-0 deficit to score a decisive 25-13 win over the Hope Dutchmen in the grid finale for the 1948 season. Two first period scores by the Hope lads were all they could muster against the strength of the opposing Alma eleven.

Assured of the league title regardless of the outcome of the final game, the Alma team was unpleasantly surprised when the Hope eleven took the opening kickoff on their own ten, with Yonker returning the ball to the 21, and then, amassing 4 first downs in a row, the Holland collegians marched down the field in ten plays to pay dirt. Holwerda kicked for the extra point, but the Alma line converged to block the attempt.

Minutes later, with Alma trapped back on their own 23 yard line, Rex Roseman backed up to punt out of danger, but Hope came through the line in the person of big "Hoose" Holwerda, and the Dutch end scooped up the ball and went 12 yards to another Hope score. This time Holwerda completed the conversion successfully the ball going squarely through the center of the up-rights.

Alma then settled down to the game at hand, and duplicated the feat performed by Hope at the start of the game, going in ten plays, and with four straight first downs, to the Hope end zone and six points, Roseman going the final 10 yards to score. Alex Kish attempted the conversion which went wide, and Hope was leading as the teams reversed the field

for the beginning of the second quarter.

After four plays, Hope surrendered the ball to Alma, and the locals went down the field again, four first downs, 9 plays, and another score, with Joe Slotnick scoring from the 3 yard line, and Kish being successful in his conversion try, and the score stood 13-13 at halftime.

Second half efforts saw the Dutchmen fail to get within the Alma 30 yard line except on one occasion, and that threat was busted up when Ray Mohre intercepted a Hope pass on Alma's 23 yard line in the third quarter.

Midway in the third quarter, Alma got its third score on a beautifully executed play. Third down and seven on the Alma 34 yards line, Kish passed to Joe Thibedeau who took the ball on the midfield stripe, attempted to run, was trapped, and lateraled to Dick Derby who came bounding through the line, Derby completing the last 47 yards for a touchdown. Another conversion attempt by Kish soured when the Hope line pushed through to block the try.

Still not satisfied with the score, the Scots dug in again, and climaxed a march from the Hope 22 yard line with a score by Roseman who plunged from the one yard marker. Slotnick attempted to run through for the extra point, but the officials ruled his knee had touched the ground on the one yard line. The game ended with Hope in possession of the ball, 1st and ten, one their own ten yard line.

Defensive play in the game was led by Alma linemen, Ken Corbin, and George Nickel. Outstanding in his department was Joe Thibedeau at left and Dick Derby, left tackle. The lateral from Thibedeau to Derby was one of the most brilliantly completed plays seen in many a day, and it was a wonderful sight to see the big

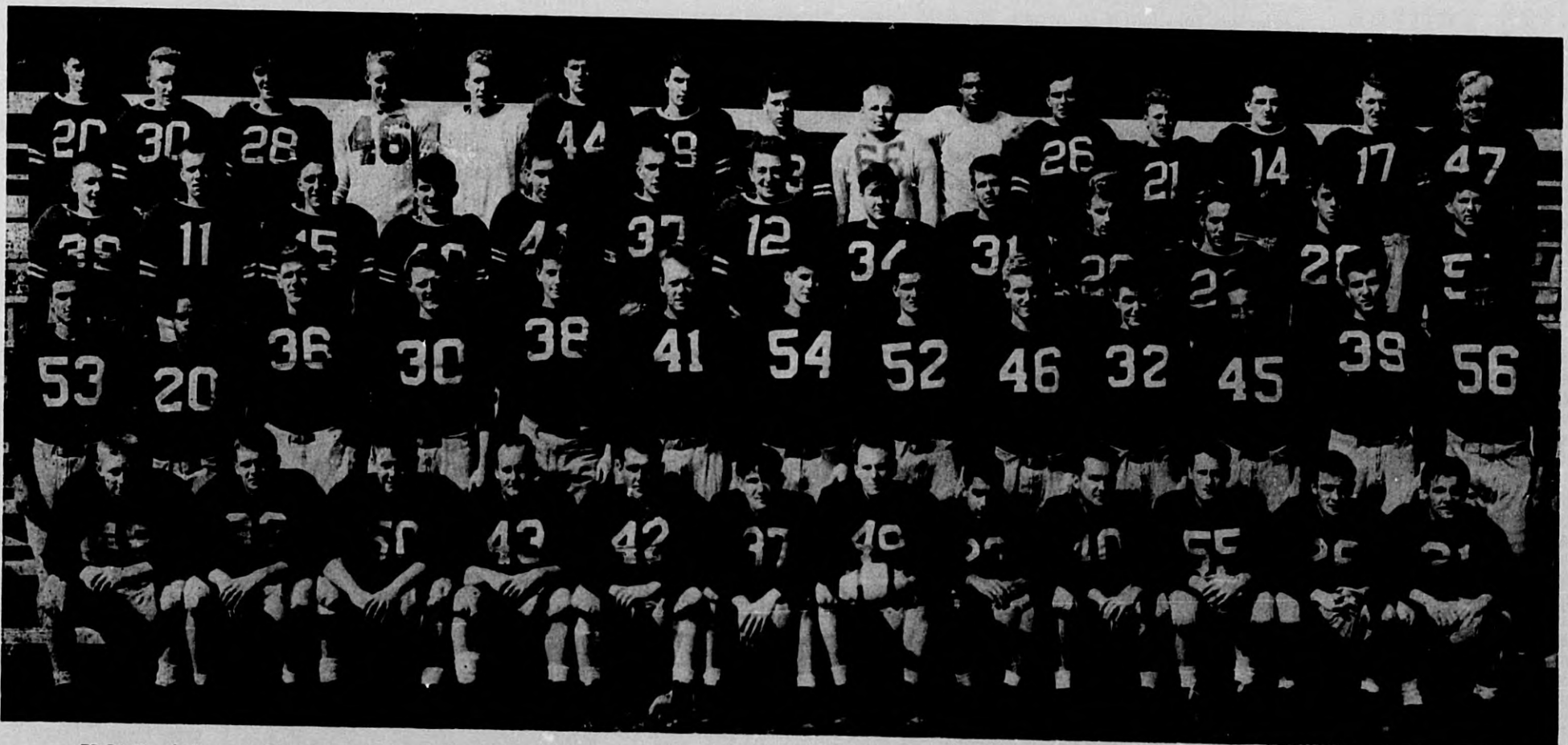

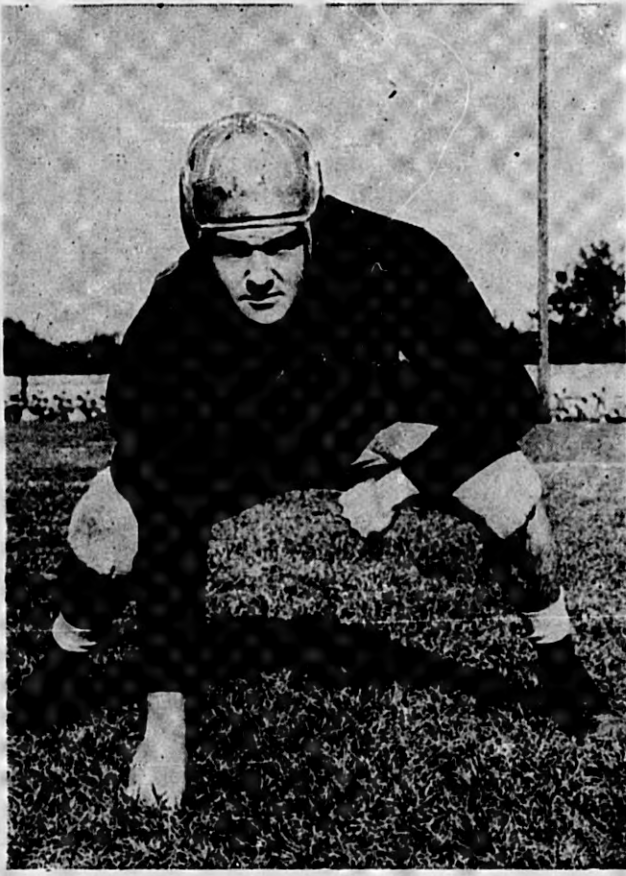

Dancing, games, fortune telling, photos, and freaks provided entertainment for the evening. The event was open to the public.

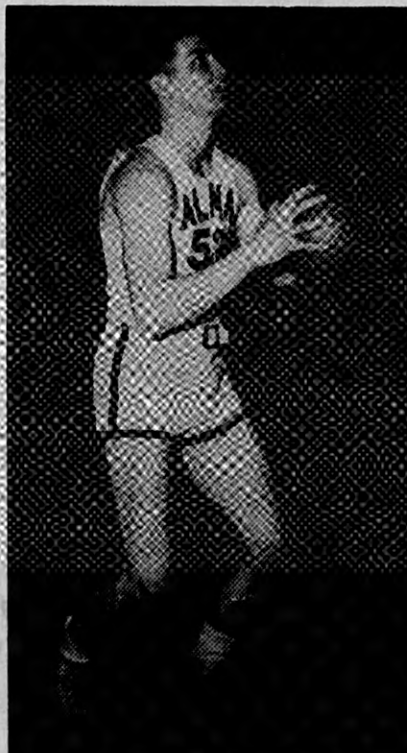

## Scots Move Up from Fifth Place in Single Year of Competition

The local harriers sped to a second place in the MIAA X-Country run yesterday afternoon over the Pine River Course, garnering 60 points, with Albion, the winner for the third straight year finishing with 31 points. Chuck Williams and Bob Mohre, consistent winners for Alma through the season, came up fast in the home stretch and copped the third and fourth positions, right behind first place runner Ted Hagadone of Albion, and runner-up, Cris Nezamis, Kalamazoo.

The three and one half mile run started at Bahlke Field, included one and a half turns around the track, out to the golf course, down the road near the island, west of the golf course, then back to Bahlke Field. Coach Sebo's Coaching Classes handled the administrative duties connected with the run, with Merton Dean, local businessman recording orders of finish.

Going into the league meet, Alma was tied up with Kalamazoo for second place, with Albion comfortably in first place. Adrian and Hope were tied for the next position, and Hillsdale was out of the running. With Hope finishing one place above Kalamazoo in the meet, the two schools moved into a tie for third place honors.

Alma had men placed along all the way, with Rodney Grover, 14th, Jim Colter, 17th, Harry Brunett, 22nd, and of course, Williams and Mohre in the first five. Alma's number 6 and 7 men, Bruce Brown and Fred Snellenberger, finished 28th and 31st respectively.

It was a great race as far as the locals were concerned. For the past two years, Alma has been at the bottom of the heap, last year finishing a lowly fifth. Chuck Williams, fifth place winner last year moved up to third this season, and Bob Mohre, new to MIAA running, is a good bet for further honors next year. All the Alma Boys will be returning for another two years, so the Scots have much to look forward to. Both Hope and Kalamazoo were rated above the local lads prior to this meet.

## MIAA Oldest West of Alleghenies

The M.I.A.A. is the oldest conference west of the Allegheny Mountains.

First evidences of football involving present colleges in the M.I.A.A. date back to 1884, four years before the conference was organized, when Albion and Michigan played in what is believed to be the first intercollegiate football game in the state. In 1889, at the second annual M.I.A.A. Field Day, Albion and Olivet engaged in an exhibition "football match." This was followed in 1891 by a regular game between Hillsdale and Albion, the oldest rivals in the association. By 1894 Kalamazoo, Adrian, Olivet, Michigan State, Hillsdale and Albion were all scheduling games with conference teams. Alma entered the football picture in 1895 when the Alma-Kalamazoo rivalry began.

In 1904, Albion was awarded the first official conference championship as recognized by the board of directors. At that time there were six colleges, Albion, Michigan State, Olivet, Alma, Kalamazoo, and Hillsdale in the conference.

Since that time, Michigan Normal became a member and dropped out, and Olivet and Michigan State are no longer members. Hope entered the conference in 1927.

# USAF Team Here Friday

The opportunity for pilot training and a career as an officer with the United States Air Force which is open to qualified college men will be explained to Alma men on Nov. 19th and 22nd by a special Air Force Aviation Cadet Team, Lt. Col. W. E. Ruehlmann said today.

Men, 20 to 26½ years old, and physically fit, with two or more years of college, will have the opportunity to provisionally qualify for the flight training immediately when the traveling Aviation Cadet team meets here at the business office, Colonel Ruehlmann said. The team is headed by Major Clayton M. Dougherty and is one of several which is visiting colleges throughout the country.

Men who volunteer and are accepted for pilot training with the Air Force will receive their basic flight training in Texas. Successful Cadets will be given their pilots' wings and commissions as 2nd Lieutenants in the Air Force Reserve after only 12 months of training. They will go on active duty immediately upon graduation

and can earn pay and allowances in excess of \$4,000 a year.

Aviation Cadet classes begin three times a year . . . on March 1, July 1, and October 15, and the top men in each class receive direct commissions in the regular Air Force. All graduates have the opportunity to apply for regular commissions during their active duty tours.

Only men who meet the high Air Force standards will be accepted Colonel Ruehlmann pointed out, because of the necessarily high level of intelligence and physical fitness required to operate modern military aircraft. On the 19th and 22nd of Nov. the Aviation Cadet teams will be prepared to administer all preliminary examinations to flight-training applicants. Those who meet the requirements at that time need only take the final physical examination and complete an interview later before being finally accepted and assigned to a class.

Basic flight training courses are given at Randolph Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas; Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, Texas; Perrin Air Force Base, Sherman, Texas; and Waco Air Force Base, Waco, Texas. Basic training is given in single-engine T-6 Texans. Advanced pilot training phases are given at two locations . . . single-engine in F-51 Mustangs and F-80 Shooting Stars at
