The stinging Kalamazoo Col-lege Hornets wing into town thi^ evening in quest of their eighth C O P H MIAA win in nine starts. Alma will square off against the Kazoo quintet at 8:00 at Memorial Gym in a contest which may well decide the league championship. A record crowd is expected to witness the encounter.

Kalamazoo smashed every league opponent in the first. round, and had a good start on the backstretch drive until the meeting with the Albion College Britons last Saturday night at Albion. The plucky Albion team got the jump on the Hornets, took an early 15-3 lead and never relinquished that position. Kazoo never got closer than six points. This is the same Albion team that started off the second round with a humiliating defeat at the hands of the Scots of Alma College, of 29.

Alma could prove to be the giant killer and set itself up in good challenging position depending upon the outcome of the Alma-Hillsdale, and Kazoo-Hope contests, both to be played on Friday night. The league race could end in a three way tie beset-up is unique.


