type of examination-essay or
objective-is better, reveals that objective-is better, reveals that
students here are almost equally students here are almost equally
divided as to their choice. There are 51 per cent in favor
of objective, 48.5 per cent in
favor of essay and 5 per cent favor of essay and 5 per cent
have no preference. Sixty per cent feel that an objective exam
calls for more preparation, 39 per cent feel that essay requires more
study, while one per cent make study, while
no comment.
For a better consensus of merit of the grade attained, 55 per cent
cited objective, 45 per cent essay. It was almost decisive that
neither type can be given for all neither type can be given for all
or most of the courses given. or most of the courses given.
There is a tendency to grade objective exams of the on
