## College Receives **Building Fund** Gift of \$250,000

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The Almanian features, for its Christmas issue, the announcement of a \$250,000 gift to Alma College by the Van Dusen Trust Fund. The announcement came through a letter from Mr Charles Van Dusen to the Board of Trustees of Alma College and made at the meeting of the Building Campaign Committee held in Westminster Presbyterian Church in Detroit.

This quarter of a million dollars is the initial gift in the college's campaign for two and a half million dollars for new buildings and major improvements at the college. The campaign will begin on January 1, and has been authorized and approved by the Synod of

Building Priorities

The Van Dusen Trust Fund gift will be applied toward the building of a new girl's dormitory, which will be first on the priority list of new buildings, following completion of the Tyler Building.

The new girls' dormitory will continue diving hell to sent five huntain a dining hall to seat five hundred persons.

Dr. Harker says that everything in the building program is being planned for a school of five hundred. College authorities want to keep Alma a small college, but second to none in quality.

The total two and a half million dollar program calls for the new girls' dormitory and remodeling of Wright Hall into an attractive men's dormitory, a science hall and a music hall. In addition, the budget is allowing for general campus improvements, including a new baseball diamond, permanent football bleachers, walks, roads, and landscaping. A provision is also made for enlarging and modernizing the heating


