Hershey today announced that Selective Service will not make any special provisions to give students 30 days after the end of their academic year to enlist in the service of their choice. General Hershey explained that such arrangements are not necessary this that students are henceforth to be deferred instead of having their induction postponed and that any student pursuing a full time.

Advise Current Status

The Selective Service law places upon each registrant the obligation of keeping the local board advised of his current status. Discretion of Boards The President has prescribed a Class II-S student deferment program. Students may be placed in this classification, General Hershey explained, at the discretion of their local boards. To assist the boards in determining which students should be given II-S deferments, a method was set up whereby students who are in the prescribed upper portion of the male members of their class or who made a score of 70 or better on the Selective Service College Qualification Test may be considered by their local board for deferment. The law provides, however, that local boards are not required to defer men who meet one or both of the criteria. This is still discretionary on the part of the board. General policy is that students meeting either or both criteria will be deferred.

Appeals Students who meet one or both of the criteria for II-S deferment have a right of appeal if their local board does not defer them. 28 members who participate in The law provides that a student may appeal to the State Appeal college credit at the Lake Michither their interest in the Home Economics field. 

Many students have been confused, General Hershey observed, in differentiating between the I-S and II-S deferments. The II-S deferment is considered on the basis of class standing or qualification test and is discretionary on the part of the local board, General Hershey explained. It may be granted by the local board each successive year, thus enabling students who meet the critis dedicated to the proposition eria to complete their education. I went back to college with a new outlook on life. There were weeks between Christmas vacation and final exams. If I cou "knock a course" in three weeks then I was not much of a man first thing I did on returning to the campus was to lock myself room for three straight days with that detested math book. I was well enough in all my other courses and I cut them for three d did not even go to that math class. I was so far behind that I mi well stay away until I had caught up with the field. I went no except to meals for three full days. And I slept about six hours night. I began with the first page of that detested math text mastered every principle right through the last assignment Christmas. I worked enough problems in every section to convince self that I had the matter in hand.

I got a "B" out of the course. I met that surprised prof on the pus the first day of second semester. He said to me, "Harker, you the only perfect exam paper in my class. I ought to have given y "A", but you were so lazy throughout the course that it hurt me to even give you that "B". And I knew what he meant.

All this was thirty years ago. I still look upon that detested course as one of the decisive periods in my life. That was one times when I had to decide whether I was going to "run away life" or "run around life" or "face up to life". That was the first I actually faced up to life. I saw that if I flunked that course, I di merely flunk Math 11. I myself flunked. And I did not intend to 'flunker" in life.
