Membership in the Student Council will also warrant activity credits. These two motions were approved by a faculty committee in charge of activity credits. It is quite certain that the faculty as a whole will also agree to both of these new rules.

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## Sports in the News

Since the season has been concluded, it is the time of year for all to recall just exactly what has occurred during the past year, to see how many records have been broken or surpassed, and to have an over-all resume of the previous basketball season.

Alma wound up in fourth place in the MIAA league standings with a league record of five wins and five defeats. Hope College ended the season in first place with an excellent 9-1 record. The league race this year was extremely exciting and the battle was on until the final game. This factor is fairly obvious as both Albion and Kalamazoo finished second with an 8-2 record, only one more defeat than Hope. Close ball games were the vogue this year. Hillsdale finished below Alma, with Adrian occupying the cellar spot.

The Scot team set a few records which may stand for some time. Packing a tremendous offensive wallop, Alma scored a total of 1493 points to set a new team season record. As a team the Alma quintet set another school record for scoring the highest amount of points in a single game with a record-breaking 99 against Soo Tech. Another team record was the record at Lawrence Tech for the most points scored in a ball game, a total of 190 points being racked up by the two teams.

Individually, the Alma Scot players were immensely successful also. The "Big Three" of Pueschner, Healey, and Hamilton, terrific offensive stars, all exceeded the previous season total scoring record, held by Jack Howe with 300 points. Hamilton sets the new goal with an amazing 373 points for this season! Bill Healey was close behind with 350, followed by Bob Pueschner with 310. Between these three men, 1033 of the team's 1493 points were scored! Pueschner also just barely missed the game record of 33 points by scoring 31 in the Hillsdale game.

The veteran Bill Healey set another individual record for four years of college play which will definitely be a difficult one to break. Healey scored a total of 830 points to eclipse the previous record. Both Hamilton and Pueschner amassed better than 600 points during their four year performances, certainly a "better than creditable" performance.

Undoubtedly these records will give future Alma athletes something to shoot for and it will present a goal which practically approaches the impossible. It will be interesting to watch future happenings!

Ending the season with a victorious spree of three victories in their last four games, the Alma Scots "ground out" an 85-63 win over the Ferris five at Ferris Monday night. In rolling up a comparatively easy victory, the Alma first five combined a flashing offense with an adequate defensive game to display once again their excellent team-work when hot. In the first quarter the Scots gained a 17-11 six point edge, and were never again headed. At half-time Alma had trampled to a commanding 40-23 lead and the Ferris quintet was doomed to defeat.

Following the intermission, the Alma team made able use of its substitutes in finishing the season with the 22 point, 85-63 margin of victory. Leading the Scot netters in scoring were the trio (so

often known as the "Big Three" in Alma College basketball), of Captain Mick Hamilton with 22, uncanny Bob Pueschner ranging up 21, and the inimitable Bill Healey hitting the hoops for another 21.

Finishing their careers at Alma College were the veterans Mick Hamilton, Bob Pueschner, Bill Healey, diminutive Bobby Mohre, and Hess Wever, all seniors who have concluded four basketball years at Alma. These seniors deserve credit for their fine sportsmanship and top-notch ability on the basketball court shown during the years they have represented Alma. Despite the season's mediocre record of 9 wins against 11 losses, it will be some time before Alma will again have such excellent material on the basketball floor. Also deserving mention for fine play this year is sophomore John Sawyer, the other member of the starting five, and the only first stringer to return next year. Also returning are Rich Garrett, Mike Bramble, Gordie MacDonald, Bill Fitch, and Bob Luchies. In concluding the season we wish to congratulate the team for their excellent exhibition of basketball while wearing the Alma colors.

## Kazoo Wins 73-62

The Scots traveled to Kalamazoo to find the Hornets having a hot night and met defeat 73-62, with Kalamazoo pulling away slightly in the third quarter. Tangling with the Hornets proved costly for the Scots as they could not overcome the gradually earned lead which Kalamazoo had acquired. Once again, leading the Alma Scots in point production as Bob Pueschner with 14, and close behind were Bill Healey and Mick Hamilton with 13 apiece. The score by quarters:
