According to a statement released by the registrar's office, the number of applications on hand at the present time indicates that Alma college should have a freshman class of well over 200 new students in the fall of 1954. The American Association of College Registrars and Admissions Officers has prepared a report estimating college age population trends from 1940-1970. According to this report, the great influx of students entering college has not yet hit Michigan. This state is not expected to receive much of an increase in the total number of students attending college until 1960. From 1960 to 1970 there should be an addition of approximately 300,000 students to Michigan colleges.
